PENDLETON (AP).—The largest of the 1924 wheat crops that have been held by Umatilla county farmers was disposed of recently by J. T. Lienallen and sons who farm around the Adams district. The Umatilla crop amounted to about 43,000 bushels and was sold to a grain dealer of Pendleton for a price that was said to be around a dollar.

Grain men say there are several other big crops being held over from 1923. Grain dealers are offering about a dollar for this year's crop.

later rebuked the measures taken to express to the United States the regret of the Japanese government for the incident.

Baron Sakatani asserted that the Japanese heart is shocked by this incident, which unless promptly put in its proper light, may undermine Japan's legitimate protest against exclusion and alienate the sympathy of the world. He urged that the government prevent recurrence of such "outrages," of which every Japanese disapproves.

He urged the Kato ministry to consider what steps might be taken in the event of reciprocal incidents in the United States.

The conclusion of Baron Sakatani's speech dealt with inquiries on immigration to South America of Japanese, land laws in the United States, dual citizenship, and other laws.
