TWO STATES TO CELEBRATE

FREEWATER, Ore. (AP) — Communities of Washington and Oregon, located along the Walla Walla Valley railroad, will commemorate the extension of the railroad from Freewater to Tumplin, Oregon, with a joint Fourth of July celebration at Tumplin, according to plans announced by the committee in charge.

The new track, a seven mile stretch, linking the two towns, will be completed at this time and is expected to provide transportation for farm produce and other commodities raised in that region.

Bonus Freewater and Chinapin a number of other communities have signified intention of participating in the celebration, including Fruitvale and Valley Chapel, Ore., and Lowden and Touchet, Wash. Representatives of the Northern Pacific and Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation companies are expected to be present. The new seven mile stretch will be used jointly by these two companies.

"King" of Irish Island Jailed for Making Moonshine

DUBLIN (AP) — Inhabitant, an historic island in the Atlantic off the coast of Sligo, and described as "the next parish to America" has been discovered to be an active home of the trade in illicit whiskey. The civil guards raided it and found eight barrels of poteen and large quantities of material with the necessary stills.

The island, like some others off the Irish coast, has a "king" in the person of Michael Waters. He was sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labor, and a fine of \$250. Two of his associates got the same jail sentence with fines of \$125.

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GRETNA GREEN DAYS RECALLED

LONDON (AP) — Something of the romance of Gretna Green, the little Scottish village that for more than 100 years was the haven for couples who, for one reason or another could not be married in England, was recently brought to light in a London auction room when the original marriage certificates of nearly 1200 runaway couples, extending over the period of 1525-1854, were sold for \$1400.

Among the most romantic of the marriages, the certificate of which was among those sold, was that of Prince Carlo Borbone, younger brother of King Ferdinand II of the Two Sicilies, to Penelope Carolyn Smith, of Waterford, Ireland, in 1535. The couple first lived in Naples and were expelled. They fled to Rome and were married there, but later, upon visiting the bridegroom's sister, the Queen Regent of Sicily, found themselves estranged and were again married at Madrid. When they arrived in England they were advised to go through another ceremony at Gretna Green and finally, to placate the hostility of English society, they were married for the fourth time at St. George's, Hanover Square, London.

Another romantic marriage was that of Lady Adela Cornelia Mount Villiers, daughter of the Earl of Jersey, who eloped in 1815 with Captain Charles Burke, a member of the British army. It was coincident that the bride's grandmother, Miss Sarah Child, daughter of the founder of Child's bank, had also been married at Gretna Green to Lord Westmoreland, and had been pursued by her father who was only persuaded to give up the chase when one of the horses drawing his coach had been shot by his prospective son-in-law.

Other runaway marriages brought to light at the sale included that of Ellen Turner, a schoolgirl, to Edward Gluzon Wakefield, who was sentenced in 1826 to three years imprisonment for abduction after parliament had by a special act annulled the ceremony. Lady Rose Somerset, daughter of the seventh Earl of Desmond, to Captain Francis Lovell, in 1836; Miss Carolyn Clayton to Lord Drumlanrig, afterwards seventh Marquess of Queensbury, in 1840.

All the marriages during the period covered were celebrated by John Linton, keeper of the inn at Gretna Green, and it was a descendant of the inn-keeper that offered the certificates for sale.

SALEM, Ore. — The North Fork Telephone company, with capital stock of \$1200 and headquarters at Monument, Grant county, has been incorporated by Clyde Jackson, J. D. Boyer and J. S. Turner.

Indian Boys in College

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Thirty-seven tribes of American Indians are represented in two Kansas National Guard units, of 80 men each, at Haskell Institute here. These are said to be the only two Indian units in the United States.

Company D of the 157th Infantry was organized at Haskell three years ago. A few days later the Haskell authorities were granted permission to organize a troop of cavalry. The infantry company won out over every competing outfit in field activities at the last Kansas

National Guard encampment. Three white men, instructors at Haskell, are officers in the cavalry troop. Only two white men, both officers, are connected with the infantry unit. Walker D. Owl, first lieutenant of the infantry outfit, is a full-blooded Indian and the son of a chief.

Ship Cuts Whale in Two

SAN PEDRO, Cal. (AP) — An enormous sperm whale, part of a large school playing about the ship, was struck by the Panama-Pacific liner Finland and cut in half while the liner was off the Mexican coast recently. It was reported on the arrival of the Finland here.
