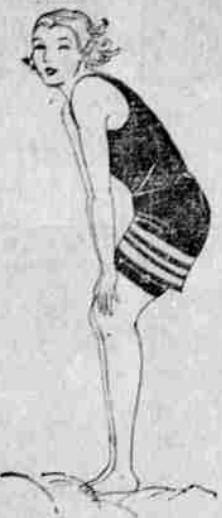

"Spawn of the Desert" On at Sherrys Today Only.

It's William Fairbanks' latest Western feature, "Spawn of the Desert," adapted from a story by W. C. Tuttle.

The story is set back in the old "gold-rush" days in the early fifties and deals with the adventures of Duke Steele, a desert guide, played by Mr. Fairbanks and his partner, Sam, La Saint, a desert pirate.

When they arrive in the lonely town of Calico, set down amid the desert rocks, things begin to happen thick and fast. It develops that "The Saint," a mighty weathered man with a long white beard, has at last found in Calico, what he has been searching for almost all his life—the slayer of his wife and despoiler of his home. In the end he is too weak to exact the toll which is rightfully his from the man who has wrecked his life but his pal steps into the breach. The scrap which follows is far and away the best we have ever seen on the screen. If there were nothing else in the picture it would be well worth your while to see it. As it is, however, it serves only as a tremendous climax to the thrilling incidents that come before.

Although William Fairbanks is the star and gives a performance that teems with action and thrills, a word must be said for the actor who plays the bearded, pious-looking old gambler known as "The Saint." It is as good a piece of character acting as we have seen in many a day.

Florence Gilbert is well cast as the girl and the supporting cast is all that could be desired.

Indian Who Had Historic Mission in Alaska Dies

DOUGLAS, Alaska. (AP).—Dick Morgan, an Indian who died recently, was a historic character of Alaska. It was recalled by the Rev. A. P. Kashevaroff, of Juneau.

Morgan, whom the United States naval authorities had employed as a policeman nearly 25 years ago, was sent with a message from Captain L. A. Beardslee to settle differences that had arisen between the Kockwontah and Gannadi tribes north of Sitka. Morgan informed the chiefs of the warring factions that they were to preserve order and to permit the white men to go thru the Yukon passes.

Morgan returned February 12, 1898, with word to Captain Beardslee that the Indian factions would remain peaceful and that the white men could enter the country without fear. As a result of this parley the Chilkat country was opened to miners.

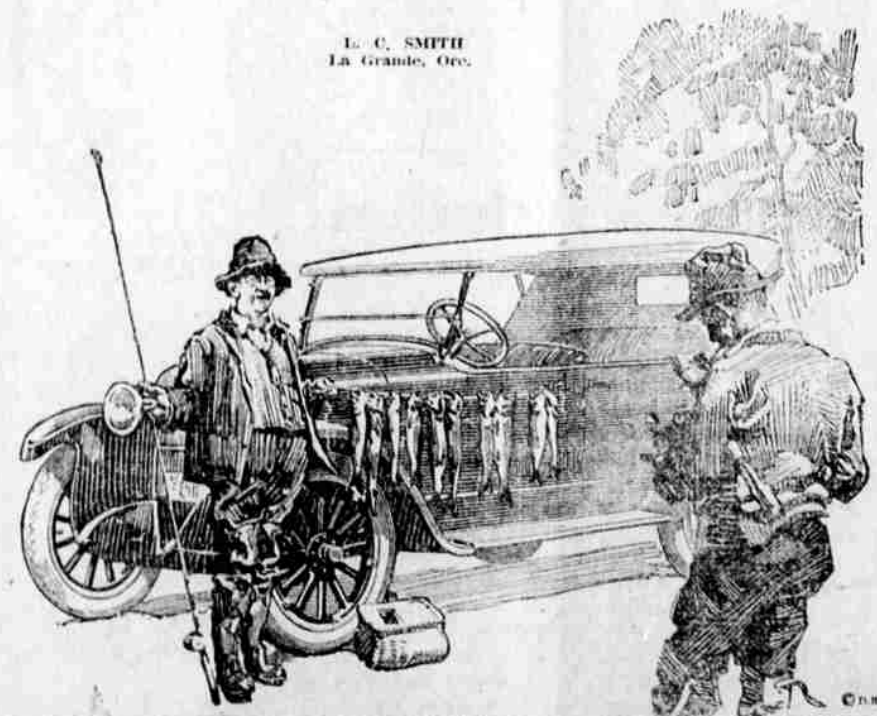
