POLICE RAID UNEARTH'S NEST OF DERELICTS

BERLIN (AP)—A recent police raid upon the public "Asylum for the Shelterless," corresponding somewhat to the American rescue missions except that it is a municipal institution, yielded some unusual results.

It was found that among those housed were 1204 men and 76 women and girls who had nothing on their persons to identify them. In Germany and other European countries one is expected at all times to carry some paper of identification, and its absence is enough to arouse the suspicions of the police.

These 1280 persons were held for further investigation, and the following facts developed: For 157 of the men search warrants have been out for some time; they were wanted for theft, burglary, murder or swindling. In the case of 22 it developed that they had forged papers. Three men reported dead were discovered hale and hearty. Among them was a 27 year old shop keeper whose business had gone bankrupt, and who then had to live off his aged father. When the latter was dismissed from civil service as part of the economy program of the government, the young man disappeared and left word that he had committed suicide.

Hints for the Housewife

DELICIOUS STRAWBERRY AND BANANA JAM

When strawberries get really cheap and are so ripe that they must be used at once then let the housewife add some glasses of strawberry and banana jam to her assortment of preserves.

Pick over the strawberries and let them stand, well covered with sugar, in an enameled ware preserving kettle over night. This is safe to do as the porcelain-like surface of the kettle will not darken or injure the fruit. In the morning add finely cut up bananas in the proportion of one cup of bananas to two cups of strawberries. Add sugar in proportion of one cup of sugar to one and one-half cup of fruit. Set on the back of the stove and cook slowly until all is a smooth mass. Then cook faster until the jam is thick enough. Should any lumps remain they can be rubbed out with an enameled ware skimmer. This jam is universally liked.

CUSTARDS—BAKED OR BOILED

Custards are not only an agreeable dessert, but they are very nourishing and taken by themselves make a light but satisfying luncheon on a hot day. Here is a good rule for baked custard. Scald four cups of milk in an enameled ware double boiler. Beat four eggs slightly and add one-half cup of sugar and a pinch of salt. Put the beaten eggs into an enameled ware bake dish which should be well buttered; set the dish in a pan of hot water and bake in a slow oven until the custard is firm. If cooked too long or too fast the custard will whey. The custard should be eaten cold.

A boiled custard makes a nice substitute for cream on fruit or berries. Scald two cups of milk in an enameled ware double boiler. Beat the yolks of three eggs slightly, add one quarter cup of sugar and a pinch of salt. Add the hot milk slowly stirring all the time. Cook in an enameled ware double boiler stirring constantly until the mixture begins to thicken. If the custard is to be eaten by itself, flavoring may be added at the end. If it is to be used as a sauce, it is better plain.

Quaint Signpost Appeal Halts German Emigrants.

CONSTANCE, Germany (AP)—At a fork of the road just out of the village of Weller, near Lake Constance, a sign board which reads, "Germans thinking of going to the Americas, please take this route," has been stuck up. Although it roused the ire of the local authorities at first the sign was permitted to hold its place when its motive was explained by Hans Durst, its author, known locally as the village philosopher.

Too many persons of Weller, and other localities in this part of southern Germany had been talking of emigrating to North and South America, Durst explained to the authorities, and this fact inspired him to take some action to make the would-be emigrants think twice before taking the final step, which would take them to foreign lands.

"Once the intending emigrants visit my lookout," said Durst to the authorities, "and see their own town and country from my hillside, and realize what a beautiful country they have been living in, they immediately give up the idea of seeking their fortunes elsewhere. All is contentment in Weller nowadays, and there is no more talk of going to the Americas either this year or next. I hope soon to put my sign on stone and keep it at the cross roads for all time."

Haywood Falls as Drawing Card on Soviet Lecture Platform.

RIGA (AP)—William (Big Bill) Haywood, convicted in W. W. leader who jumped his bail in Chicago and fled to Russia several years ago, has taken the lecture platform, according to American travelers recently from Moscow. Although he knows only a few words of Russian, he speaks through an interpreter, relating his experiences in the United States with the government and telling of conditions there generally.

Haywood made an extended speaking tour in the Caucasus this spring, but did not prove the drawing card that soviet officials anticipated that he would. Since his efforts to establish a self-supporting colony in the Urals, made up chiefly of bolsheviks from America, which venture proved a failure under his direction, Haywood has made his headquarters in Moscow.

Communists With Red Gloves.

Refused Oath by Burgomaster DORTMUND, Germany (AP)—Two communists who were elected as deputies of the town council in Dortmund, Germany, were refused oaths at the initial meeting of the body. When the time came for the new members to raise their right hands and take the oath of office, all the other deputies removed their gloves, as is customary in Germany, but the communists refused to do so. The burgomaster declined to swear them unless they removed their hand covering for the occasion.

After a lively discussion the communists drew the gloves from their hands and threw them on the floor in defiance of the council, and stalked out of the room. They have not met since, but as yet have not been sworn in, and so far as the other deputies are concerned, are not considered full fledged members of the town's law making body.
