

POLITICS IN CUBA MIXED

HAVANA (AP).—Cuba's national political conventions to nominate presidential candidates will be held later than ever this year, for while they usually are over before May 1, indications now are that the first one will not meet until some time in July. A presidential vice president and half of congress are to be elected November 1.

President Alfredo Zayas was elected in 1920 by a combination of the conservative party with his popular party, and interest today centers largely in whether he will seek reelection and who will be the candidate of the liberal party, commonly the strongest one. President Zayas has repeatedly stated that he will seek reelection only if drafted, but if newspapers of various shades of political belief are to be credited, opposition to reelection never was so strong throughout the island.

General Gerardo Machado, lawyer, is shown by the provincial conventions to be the outstanding candidate for the liberal nomination. Half a dozen other liberal leaders, however, are being backed as dark horses, and among them are Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, secretary of state; Governor Alberto Barrios of Havana province, and Governor Roberto Mendonza of Pinar del Rio.

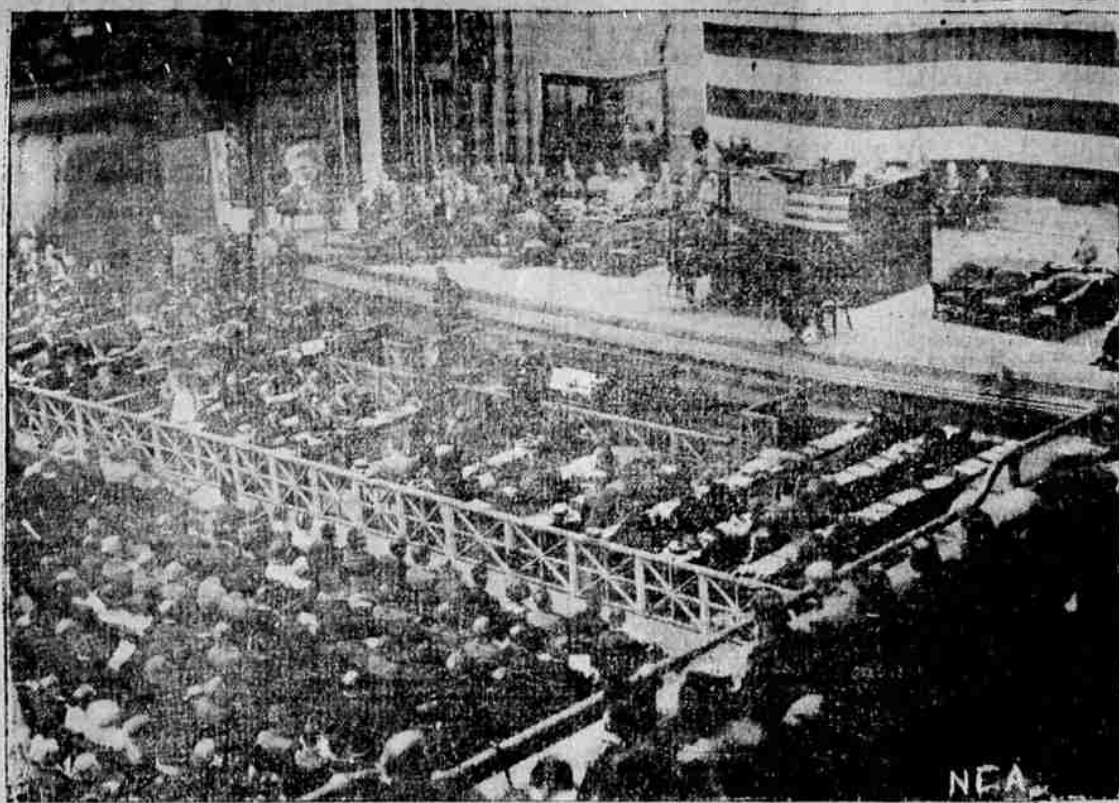
The fight in the liberal party seems to be delaying its national convention and the other parties are waiting on it.

Little activity has been shown publicly for any one in the conservative party, whose outstanding leader is former President Mario G. Menocal, the man who was largely instrumental in making Zayas president. Friends of General Menocal have mentioned his name from time to time, but this far no real campaign has been waged in his behalf. Santiago Verdecia, representative in congress from Matanzas, has had some backing for the conservative nomination, and has announced that he is receptive, but General Menocal has not made his position plain.

The popular party leaders have announced that Zayas is the only man their party will consider as its candidate, and are known to be working for reconstruction of the "Liga Nacional" as the conservative-popular combination of 1920 was called.

FOREIGN STATES INVITED TO OLD HICKORY REUNION

CHARLESTON, S. C. (AP).—Plans are nearing completion for the annual reunion here, August 12 and 13, of veterans of the Thirtieth Division, popularly known as the "Old Hickory," which shares with the Twenty-seventh Division of New York, the honor of breaking the Hindenburg line in northern France. Major J. D. E. Meyer, United States marshal for the eastern district of South Carolina and himself an "Old Hickory" veteran, is general chairman of the committee on arrangements.

Although the Thirtieth Division was originally composed of the National Guard organizations of North and South Carolina and Tennessee, thousands of men from other states passed through its

ranks in the course of the war, many of them being replacements to take the places of the battle casualties.

The Thirtieth and Twenty-seventh Divisions never saw the American sector during the war. They were formed into the second army corps and served with the British armies from the time of their landing in France in the spring of 1918 until after the armistice. For this reason, representatives of the British, Australian and Canadian governments have been invited to the reunion, to represent the Tommies, Anzacs and Canadians beside whom they "Old Hickory" veterans fought. The French government also has been invited to send a delegation.

After the war, the Thirtieth Division was returned to the United States by way of Charleston.

cording to the promoters because of Michigan city smallpox conditions, will be staged in the same arena later in the month, according to Joe Coffey, promoter.

Jim Mason, Greb's manager, has agreed to two tentative dates, it was said, while "Pa" Stribling is expected to come to an agreement for his son. A definite date will be set as soon as Mayor William F. C. Hall of Michigan City is satisfied there will be no danger and it is expected the bout will be held around July 15th.

Tree Ablaze 52 Days
MEDFORD, Ore. — A tree struck by lightning 52 days ago in the

Crater national forest, in the Applegate district, had been slowly burning unnoticed within sight of three look-outs in an 18-mile radius until yesterday, when it fell and set fire to about 25 square feet of surrounding forest, thus attracting attention of each one of the three look-outs.

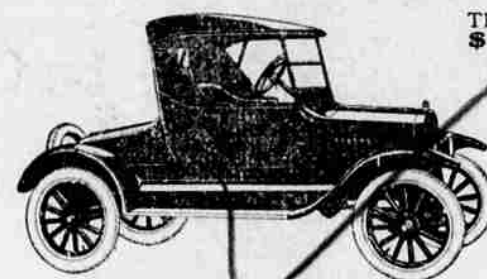

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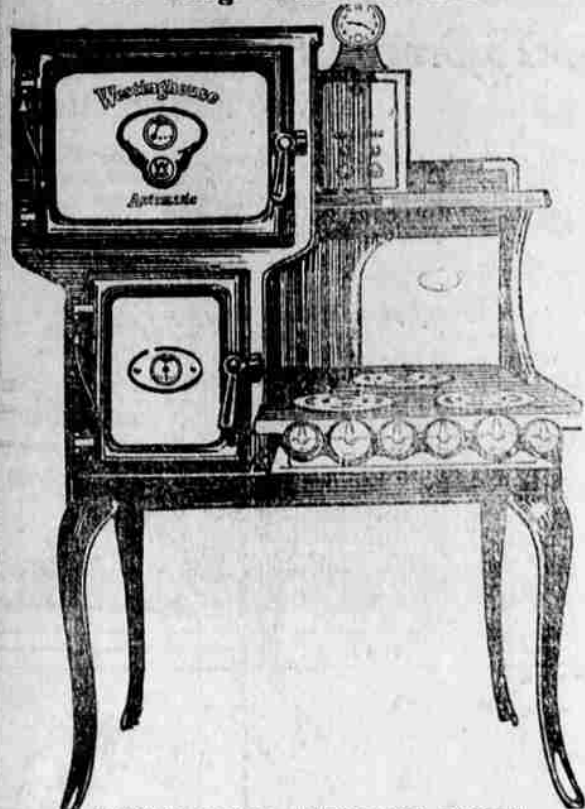
