NEW YORK. (NEA Special)—Democracy has gone a wooing. It's out to capture the ladies. And if the female in politics is half as susceptible to blandishment and beguilements as she is supposed to be in matters of the heart, the feminine vote may cut a considerable figure in the final count for political offices this fall.

The share accorded to women, in the Democratic convention, was in striking contrast to the extent of participation that was permitted them in the Republican gathering at Cleveland.

Not only were they given greater representation, numerically, in the field of delegates and alternates, but in all the convention activities they were allowed a freer hand and wielded a wider influence than was yielded them at any stage of the Cleveland proceedings.

These special courtesies to the ladies are counted on not merely to help the Democratic presidential ticket, but to be a big factor in the congressional and senatorial campaigns.

For control of the legislative end by an effective majority is no less important to the party's program than the election of their man as the executive head of the government. And aggressive assistance by women workers, it is conceded, can be particularly helpful in the local congressional fights where feminine, church, club and social pressures can best be exerted.

In this move, Democrats hope to cash in on the campaign already in full swing by the National League of Women Voters, for greater political participation by women.

The league's campaign is political, but non-partisan. It takes no part in boosting the candidates of any party. It is committed to issues of particular interest to women, including child labor and the prevention of war, but the main drive of its present campaign is to stimulate women's interest in politics to the point, where they will

MEXICO CITY. (By the Associated Press)—Reports from various parts of the country indicate that the presidential and congressional elections were held under peaceful conditions Sunday except for a few isolated cases in which unimportant clashes occurred between the followers of Gen. Plutarco Elias Calles and Gen. Angel Flores. General Calles' supporters claim for him an overwhelming victory in 15 of the 25 states, declaring that only 8 per cent of the ballots cast were for General Flores, 2 per cent for independent candidates, and the remainder for their leader. WASHINGTON. (AP)—The White House, the scene of many of the nation's sorrows, again became a home of mourning today while the whole American people, it seemed, poured in their messages of sympathy at the death of President Coolidge's 16-year-old son. Not since Lincoln's time had such a youthful member of a president's family been called by death and never under more tragic circumstances.

WASHINGTON. (By the Associated Press)—Tentative plans for the funeral of Calvin Coolidge, Jr., who died last night after a courageous fight of five days, included simple services at the White House tomorrow afternoon. The body will then be taken to Northampton, Mass., Coolidge's home, where another service will be held. Burial will be Thursday at Plymouth, Vermont, where the president was born. The president is being buried under the grief and no breakdown by Mrs. Coolidge is reported.

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—Calvin Coolidge, Jr., son of the president, died at Walter Reed hospital, of blood poisoning, Monday night. President and Mrs. Coolidge, who had maintained constant vigil at the hospital, were at his bedside, hopeful and cheering and comforting the child to the last.

MANILA. (AP)—A number of Filipino soldiers of the 57th Infantry have refused to perform duty. It is reported a Bolshevik organization has been formed among them. Eight arrests were made. The refusal to perform duty resulted from a raid carried out last Saturday night on a small group of Filipinos in Manila, all of whom are Filipinos at Fort McKinley. Another result of the raid is that all the Filipinos on duty there are suspected of Bolshevik activities.
