to life much longer than had been expected. This was the first word from the sick room since announcement was made two hours earlier that he was dying.

Oxygen Fails to Help.
A sinking spell, the fourth he had suffered in 24 hours, brought death, notwithstanding the use of oxygen and other restoratives. The courage which had withstood crisis after crisis and had beaten death off repeatedly, was unable to meet the attack. The collapse began at 6:30 and he gradually sank into eternity. He died at 10:30 o'clock.

Every resource of medical science was brought into play in the vain effort to save young Coolidge's life. An operation was performed on the left leg last Saturday night to drain off the poison and blood transfusions and oxygen were resorted to in the latter days of his illness.

The natural strength of a boy of 16, however, which was counted on as the most powerful resisting force to the creeping poison was unable to meet the issue and after having fought a brave, always losing fight he succumbed.

One of the final complications and the one which the physicians were unable to meet, was the formation of gas on the stomach.

Stomach Fails.
The organ was washed out repeatedly in an effort to put it in condition to retain nourishment, but the effort was unsuccessful.

Young Calvin was removed to the hospital Saturday and an operation performed into the marrow of the left leg. A slight rally followed, but Saturday night his condition was such that blood transfusion and oxygen administration were resorted to.

Three sinking spells Sunday night brought him to the point of death. A slight rally made Monday gave slight hope but soon thereafter he began again to lose ground and he never rallied again.

Fights Desperately.
The infection developed from a broken blister on the foot sustained during a tennis match on the White House court last Monday. It developed an alarming condition by Wednesday night. The poison once started, had spread so rapidly that medical skill was without avail.

A number of specialists were called to act with White House physicians on the case and a desperate fight for life was made.

President and Mrs. Coolidge bore up bravely. Soon after the death they went to the White House where the elder brother, John, was awaiting them.

Calvin was born April 13, 1908, at Northampton, Mass., and went through the grade schools of that city after his father had come to Washington as vice president in 1921. Both he and his brother, John, who is 17 years old, the next year entered Mercersburg academy at Mercersburg, Pa. John being graduated last month, while Calvin had another year before him. John is to enter Amherst, the president's alma mater this fall, and Calvin was to have followed him.

Was Good Student.

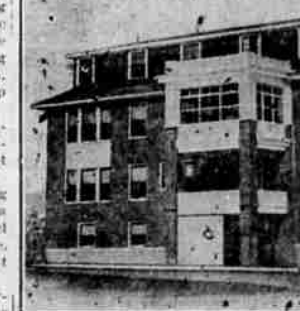
An excellent student, usually ranking high in his class, Calvin was bright and studious but not a "prammer." In the school boy sense of studiousness. He also was a good debater and had qualified for the academy debating team. He was interested in athletics but his slight build kept him from making any records along that line although he was an enthusiastic baseball player. Summer vacations usually found Calvin with his brother John at their grandfather's home in Plymouth, Vermont, but last summer John attended the military training camp at Camp Devens, Mass., while Calvin worked on a farm in the Connecticut valley of western Massachusetts. It was when at this work after his father had become president, his employer said to him excitedly, "so your father is president of the United States?" and the boy replied: "Yes, sir, I suppose he is, what do you want me to tackle today?"

already been announced by the American government, Mr. MacDonald said.

The business of the conference will be limited to bringing into effect the necessary arrangements for putting the Dawes report into operation, the prime minister said.

LONDON. (By the Associated Press)—Prime Minister MacDonald surprised the house of commons Monday by the announcement that misunderstanding which had arisen with the French government over the invitations to the inter-allied conferences at London had decided him to accept the suggestion of Premier Herriot of France to pay a hurried visit to Paris to smooth over the difficulties.

The members of the house were evidently uneasy and mystified. Both former Premier Herbert H. Asquith and former Premier Stanley Baldwin, leaders respectively of the liberal and conservative, confessed themselves perplexed by Mr. MacDonald's statement.

Mr. Asquith declared himself bewildered regarding what has happened and what is going to happen.

Both called for immediate publication of the terms of the memorandum included in the invitation to the allied powers to attend the proposed conference.

The prime minister's explanation was that the memorandum simply amounted to the minutes of the conversations at Chequers which had been communicated to the French foreign office in conformity with the usual procedure, after Mr. Herriot's visit and that as it was the outcome of the French premier's visit to London it had not been considered necessary to send a formal invitation to France. Mr. MacDonald insisted that there was nothing binding upon either government in the Chequers discussions, but that both governments had been left with complete freedom. His description of the misunderstanding which had arisen as "a storm in a teacup" however, failed to carry convictions to most of the members of the house and it became evident that when the prime minister again meets the house Thursday he will be subjected to searching questions.

Definite Date Needed.
The British premier admitted that he had made no suggestion to M. Herriot that the conference when it met, should fix an appointed day in August or September on which the Dawes report should be put into complete operation. He further emphasized the emergency of obtaining an agreement in the proper form, signed, sealed and delivered for putting the Dawes report into operation, which he said would necessitate Germany's signature. He maintained that something more than a legal document ought to be obtained from Germany.
