

BRITISH NAVY VISITS COAST

Vice Admiral Sir Frederick Field, K. C. B., in Charge of Round-the-World Squadron.

SAN FRANCISCO (By the Associated Press).—The British squadron in a cruise around the world arrived at the Golden Gate from British Columbia after a visit of three days to San Francisco the only American port of call.

The squadron, commanded by Vice Admiral Sir Frederick Field, K. C. B., is headed by the battle cruiser Hood, the greatest man-of-war afloat and includes another battle cruiser and four light cruisers.

The only clue to the means of escape were a number of razor blades which were found in the cell. Experiments with the blades showed that after a certain time they became jagged with almost a saw-like edge and it is thought that they were used in sawing the lock. The iron staple which was saved was of much softer metal than the tempered steel in the blades and although the actual length of time that it took the two men to saw the fastening is unknown it is thought by the police that the work was done

than every three years. "There are now pending in congress nearly one hundred proposals to amend the constitution, practically all of them conceived, fostered and urged by highly organized bureaus or associations," he declared. "Virtually all of them strike at the fundamental principles of our government, and many of them are fostered by the selfish interests of authority factions for purposes purely selfish. The insistent demand of this paternalistic movement is for creating new bureaus and departments and offices, vastly increasing the number of federal employees with a relative increase in the cost of government."

And yet the citizen is presumed to know all the law. "If the tendencies of the times are not checked," Mr. Saner continued, "if a halt is not called, the congress would, if unrestrained by the supreme court, speedily wipe out state lines and our government would degenerate into a paternal sumptuary bureaucracy, governing every activity of its citizens, even to the method and manner of their living, make money, frequently speak of municipal enactments and rulings of the various bureaus, commissions and departments."
