BATBOY NOW A BIG LEAGUER

Freigau in Short Space
of Three Years An-
nexes Third Base on St.
Louis Cardinals.

NEW YORK (AP)—Jumping
from batboy to regular third base-
man of the St. Louis Cardinals in
three years, Howard Freigau realized
the greatest of his boyhood
ambitions in much less time than
he ever dreamed he would. He told
the story when the Cardinals were
at the Polo grounds on their re-
cent eastern invasion.

Freigau related that he first at-
tracted the attention of Branch
Rickey, the Cardinals' boss, when
he was playing high school base-
ball. At the end of his high school
course he received offers from sev-
eral colleges, but on the advice of
Mr. Rickey went to Ohio Wesleyan.
There he began studying for an A.
B., but before he finished his
course he became a B. K. (bat-
boy), because the college diamond
did not give him enough baseball.
Manager Rickey had engaged
Freigau during the summer to look
after boys admitted to the St. Louis
park, and when the Cardinals went
on the road Freigau went along as
batboy so that he could continue
his study of big league baseball
without hurting his status as an
amateur player.

Freigau, however, had ruined
that status by playing semi-pro
games on Saturdays and Sundays,
and when the athletic authorities
at Ohio Wesleyan heard of this, the
youngster was advised that his
playing days on college diamonds
were over. The player commu-
nicated the information to Manager
Rickey, who immediately signed
him as a player.

"That was in 1922," said Freigau.
"Last year I made myself as handy
as I could, and this year I made
the grade as a regular." a

GRAZING PLAN IS PROBED

EUGENE, Ore.—D. C. Ingram,
district forest grazing examiner, is
here from the Portland office and
will spend a few days in the vicinity
of the Willamette river, where the
Western Lumber company has bought
a large tract of government
timber. Mr. Ingram will in-
vestigate the feasibility of experi-
menting on this tract in the way
of using it for grazing after it is
cut over and while the young
trees are getting a start. In other
sections of the northwest such cut-
off areas are used from five to 15
years for grazing, it was stated.

Mr. Ingram will be accompanied
by Nelson P. Macduff, supervisor
in investigating the plan.

Couquille Plans Breakwater

MARSHFIELD, Ore.—The port
of Couquille is considering construc-
tion of a breakwater of concrete,
about 400 feet in length, in the
middle fork of the Couquille river
as an aid to the logging industry
of the section above and for mills
which receive logs from the vari-
ous streams which feed that river.
The breakwater will be set at a
point where the river bed flattens
out in a gravel bar a quarter of
a mile in width and at times when
logs are run permits them to scatter
over a large area instead of
floating down to the mills and
snagging. Several hundred thou-
sand logs stranded on this bar
during the winter and spring.

Priests Come From Mongolia To Study Buddhism in Japan

TOKIO (AP)—Fifteen priests
belonging to that branch of Budd-
hism which flourishes in Mongolia
and Tibet, have arrived in Japan
for a three-year stay to study
Japanese Buddhism.

This is a case of the pupil
teaching the teacher, for Japa-
nese Buddhism is a reduplicate of
that religion as taught on the con-
tinent of Asia. It is in Japan, how-
ever, that Buddhism today has its
most virile and progressive note.
The travelers have never seen rail-
ways or steamships before under-
taking this journey and they
reached Tokio still dazed by the
rapidity with which the world out-
side their Mongolian retreats
moves.

Most of their three years will be
spent in the great monasteries
and temples in the region of Kyoto
and Nara, studying the tenets of
principal Japanese sects. Koya-
san, a powerful monastery in Iso
prefecture, headquarters of the
Shingon sect, will receive them
first.

Stamp Sales Show Increase

PENDLETON, Ore.—A gain in
stamp sales at the Pendleton post-
office of about \$1000 was shown
in the fiscal year that ended June
30, according to the report pre-
pared by Lester Cronin, assistant
postmaster. The receipts from the
sale of stamps during the year
just closed were \$12,584 as com-
pared to a total of \$12,660 for the
previous year.

HOSPITAL TO FIGHT MALARIA

MANILA (AP)—A modern hos-
pital designed primarily for the
eradication of malaria in the pro-
vinces of Pangasinan and Ilocos,
Island of Luzon, has just been
opened at the Pangasinan Sugar
Mills Central at Del Carmen, 60
miles north of Manila.

The hospital, which is one of the
most completely equipped in the
Philippines, is the gift of John D.
and Adolph H. Spreckles of San
Francisco, who are largely inter-
ested in the Del Carmen sugar cen-
tral.

The institution in addition to be-
ing used for the care of medical
and surgical cases in the two pro-
vinces will be the headquarters for
the Rockefeller Foundation and the
Philippine Health service in their
campaign for control of malaria.

The central court of the building
contains a pond, the gift of the
Rockefeller Foundation, which will
be stocked with fish from the United
States, to be studied in con-
nection with experiments on an-
opheles mosquito larvae.

It. H. Hind, general manager of
the central outlining the purpose
of the donors in making the hos-
pital possible, pointed out that the
physical welfare of the Filipino
workman was most important not
only to himself but to his employer.
