SALEM, Ore.—Mrs. W. P. Lord, pioneer Oregon resident and widow of the late Governor Lord, died here following an operation performed two weeks ago. She had been in a critical condition for several days, but it was reported Saturday that her recovery was expected. Her son, W. P. Lord, Jr., of Portland, was called here.

Mrs. Lord had been a resident of Salem for many years, and had been prominent in social and civic activities. She was 79 years of age. Besides her son, W. P. Lord, Jr., one daughter, Miss Elizabeth of Salem, survives.

SHORTAGE OF WATER NOTED

Not Enough for Irrigation Purposes at Union—City Supply Still Ample for Needs.

UNION. (Special)—Union is just now experiencing a shortage of water, especially in the irrigation ditches, several of which lead off from the stream just above town. Although the city supply is still sufficient for all purposes, the authorities are calling attention to the need of all water users being careful and to not use more than is necessary.

Chinese Who Wear Queues Compelled to Visit Barber

PEKING. (AP)—Queues are a mark of ignorance and the wearing of them does no credit to latter day China, says General Wang Chen, civil governor of Chihli province, in an order abolishing them. Two months time will be allowed "big tail" Chinese to get rid of their appendages voluntarily. After that queue-cutting parties will be staged by the police in all quarters of the province by official order.

A brief campaign of education will be carried on during the two months' respite by means of posters and hand bills. The police in the villages will assist by telling the people how foolish they are to stick to the ancient custom.

In addition to having his queue forcibly removed any Chinese failing to observe the order will be fined one dollar. The proceeds to be divided among the police who have been most conscientious in enforcing obedience.

STUDENTS ARE HURT BY TAX

Foreign Scholars in Germany Stunned by Levy of Income Revenue.

BERLIN. (AP)—Several thousand foreign students in Germany, among them many Americans, were stunned recently when the government let it be known that students were not exempt from paying the ten per cent income tax which is imposed upon Germans and foreigners alike.

The students contended that it was always understood among them that as their incomes were derived from private sources, and not from any business carried on within Germany, the government had no intention of taxing them in any form whatsoever.

The question came to a head recently when an American, who had been studying in Dresden for two years, applied for a visa on his passport which would permit him to leave Germany. The visa was refused on the ground that the student could show no receipt indicating that he had paid a tax on the income derived from his folks at home. An appeal was made to the United States consular officials, but they were unable to aid him in his predicament.

Other Americans in Berlin, Heidelberg and other university towns, since have also taken the matter up with the United States consular officials, contending that as they were under the impression that they would not have to pay the income taxes here they had spent the

money from home on rent, on books, and as they have no reserve funds on hand to pay the German government the amounts they demand, they are at a loss now what to do to take next. It is estimated that there are approximately 400 American students here who have been attending the various universities.
