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YANK LAWYERS TO SEE PARIS

American Attorneys to Attend Special Reception in France After Meeting at London.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP).—In response to invitations from Ambassador Jules Jusserand on behalf of the French government, M. Tourcau, as president of the Order of Advocates of Paris, and the American Chamber of Commerce of France, a large number of American lawyers will attend a special reception in their honor in Paris July 23-25. It was announced here by Robert E. J. Saner, president of the American association.

The Paris meeting, where the Americans will be the guests of the French lawyers, will follow immediately the adjourned session of the American Bar association, to be held in London July 24-26. A tentative program arranged includes a reception to the Paris bar at the Palais de Justice and by the municipality at Paris at Hotel de Ville on July 29; a reception at Versailles and Rambouillet by the president and premier, July 30, and a reception by the France - America committee in Paris, July 31.

The suggestion that the American bar fix the program was made by Ambassador Jusserand. The program committee included William B. Guthrie, New York; chairman; Fred R. Coudert, New York; George Deane, New Orleans; George B. Rose, Little Rock; James Brown Scott, Washington; Silas H. Strawn, Chicago; and George W. Wickersham, New York. The entertainment of the visitors will be in charge of a committee of American lawyers practicing in Paris with Hugh A. Bayne, chairman, and the following members: Watson C. Emmett, Donald Harper, Benjamin F. Conner, Gethner C. Miller and Lovins Hill.

Headquarters for the American visitors will be maintained at 57 Avenue des Champs Elysees. About 2,000 American lawyers are expected to visit London and a large proportion will attend the Paris meeting. Mr. Saner said. Others will visit with the bar of Scotland at Edinburgh, and the Irish bar at Dublin.

ANCESTRAL HOMES ARE DIVIDED BY HEIRS IN TAHITI

PAPEETE, Tahiti. (AP).—Here and there on the island of Tahiti may be seen fragments of houses, houses with the ends cut away, exposing bare rooms enclosed on three sides while the fourth remains open to the weather; houses with verandas gone; houses cut in half; others with their iron roofs taken away. Inquiry brings to light the information that these forlorn exhibits represent the workings of the French inheritance laws as applied to Tahiti.

In former times when the head of the family died the title to the property was vested in the eldest child, who conserved it for the benefit of the family at large. But the French laws have done away with this. They decree that each heir shall come into full possession of his share of any property. In consequence the courts at Papeete are congested with land litigation. The usual battleground is the homestead, which generally is a wooden building of many rooms crowded by a corrugated-iron roof and surrounded by a broad veranda. The eldest son or daughter holds the fort there. But the others, after much litigation, establish their right to share.

Armed with court orders, saws, chisels and other implements of destructive carpentry, they come and dismember the ancestral mansion, each taking his fragment to his own domain. What is left remains the heritage of the eldest, and until he gathers sufficient to repair the damage his domestic continues a melancholy monument to family disharmony, and he camps in the one or two rooms still sheltered.
