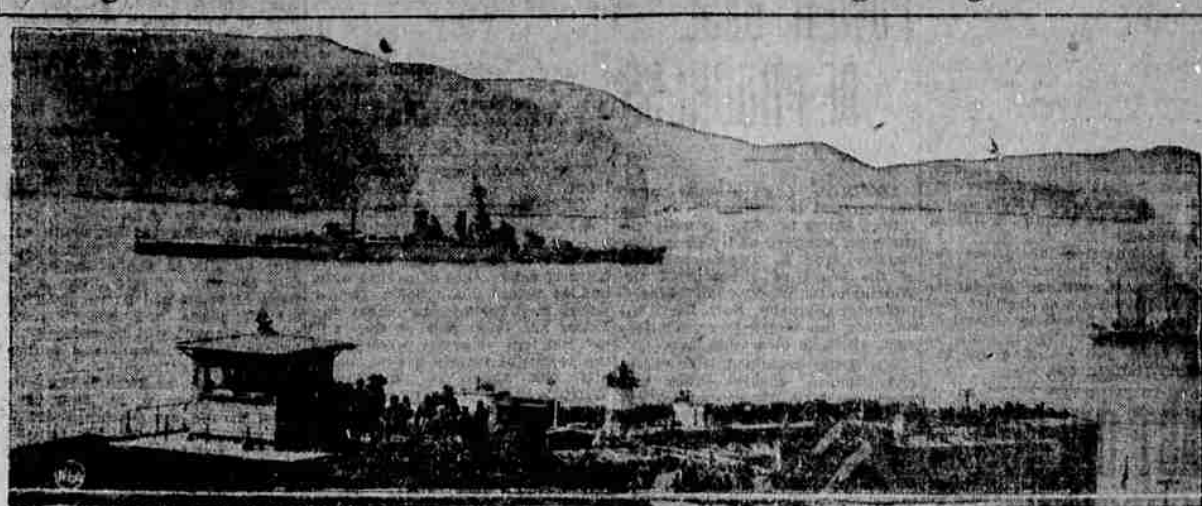

AUTO THEFT IS PERPLEXING

One of the most perplexing automobile thefts that has occurred in La Grande is the theft of the Franklin sedan, owned by Mrs. Lewis, which was taken from the Washington street garage some time Wednesday night.

The car is a 1924 model of the sedan type carrying the Franklin trademark, which is a metal lion on the front of the hood. It is black in color, has five all-weather tread new Good-year tires, double bar bumpers front and rear and an electric windshield cleaner. The engine is numbered 12-5574 and the Oregon license number is 144-558.

All theories as to who got the car still have their chance to be true for a search from Huntington to Walla Walla revealed nothing and did not support the theory that the car had been driven out of the country. According to post custom in La Grande some very chap who knows a Franklin car well has been in the habit of taking different Franklin cars and joy riding for a while, and there is a belief that he has done this with the Lewis car and perhaps left it in some side road in the valley.

Mr. Lewis is offering a suitable reward for recovery of the machine.

The suicide occurred at his brother's ranch, near Joseph.

ATTEMPT TO SUICIDE FAILS

KEISO, Wash. (By the Associated Press)—Rudolph Otto attempted to end his life in jail here late yesterday by swallowing a quantity of deadly poison. After half an hour's work physicians, using antidotes and stomach pumps, saved the prisoner's life.

Otto admitted he swallowed the drug in milk. He had concealed the capsule in a hollow space in the heel of his shoe.

The pastor, Reverend J. G. Gay, was the first to hear his cries and summoned doctors. While the physicians worked the minister pleaded with Otto to confess his wife's murder. Otto insisted, however, he did not do it, maintaining the explosion was due to an accident.

The injured were rushed to a hospital but the boys were so badly burned that doctors expressed no hope for them. Raymond died at 4:15 o'clock Friday afternoon and 16 minutes later attendants announced that the Grim Reaper also claimed his brother.

The mother, attending physicians say, has slight chances for recovery. It is thought that in her attempts to enter the house and rescue the youngest child she inhaled much smoke and her lungs are seriously affected. Her face was burned from her head.

Alone in House.

Mrs. Lawson was alone in the house with the children and was getting breakfast about 5 o'clock Friday morning when she heard a noise upstairs where the children were asleep. She went to see what had caused the commotion and upon reaching the upper floor found it a mass of flames. The only explanation of the origin of the fire was that a stove pipe from the kitchen range runs through the second floor and that some inflammable object had been pushed against it and ignited.

The father, truck driver for a local wholesale concern, was in Caldwell and arrived here a few hours after the tragedy occurred.

spirit of equity of the allies, which he had done at Chiquera. He agreed with Senator Dawes that it was impossible to stabilize French currency before the debt hanging over the country were disposed of. But he added that he had no other means of action than to support the argument that in the common fight into which the allies had put their resources in common, France was the heaviest loser.

Would Make Germany Pay. Senator Raymond Polk, interrupting, said that the American when they were ready to ask for payment of the sum owing them, would surely propose arrangements running over a considerable number of years, "and as long as we continue to pay, Germany must be made to continue to pay us."

The interrelated debts ought not to be settled mathematically, but justly," M. Herriot added.

The Dawes plan, he said, would continue to be ended the "Dawes plan" in honor of "the most devoted and disinterested of the experts."
