Spirit of Man Grows

Sir Francis Younghusband believes that Mt. Everest
will yet be climbed. He predicts his view on the propo-

tain remains the same. Two years ago man climbed to
27,000 feet on the shoulder of Everest. A month ago a
height of 28,000 feet was gained. Though the expedition
failed to attain the summit, but a thousand feet remained.
Some one will climb that last thousand feet. The top will
continue to challenge because "it is there."

The argument which Sir Francis presents is logical. He
cites how 21,000 feet was the record of man's ascent in
mountain climbing 40 years ago. A score of years ago he
had reached 23,000 feet and has been gaining ever since.
The progress has been slow but it has been steady. Man
has adjusted himself to the conditions presented. He has
changed as he found change necessary. That many have
failed and some have been killed does not discourage others.
There are men ever ready to attempt what has never been
done.

It is this ambition to do something that has never been
done that has lifted mankind from savagery to the pres-
ent state of the race. Climbing Mt. Everest is but one
manifestation of the desire for achievement. The mass
of the effort has been directed in more practical channels
and with a more direct bearing on everyday life but all
of it has been prompted by a desire to further man's power
over physical forces. The physical forces remain constant.
It is man who changes. As man is altered in the direction
in which his ambition reaches the impossible becomes possi-
ble. "It is the spirit of man which grows with the age of
the race."

Chilled Iceboxes
Delay to the Iceman

CHICAGO (AP).—You're ice-
man, provided he has an average
route and a distributing terri-
tory in the residential district,
shoulders two tons of ice a day
carrying each piece a distance of
100 feet, according to a survey
conducted by the National Associa-
tion of Ice Industries.

These 4,000 pounds of ice are
divided among approximately 50
refrigerators, the survey shows,
and the field of work covers
an average distance of two miles.

An ability to stand the phys-
ical strain, at a threat of impair-
ing health, bolsters the iceman less
than in keeping on schedule, the
association says, which is empha-
sizing to put ice routes on the
same basis of punctuality as the
transportation systems.

"The iceman's greatest trouble
is keeping on scheduled time, be-
cause housewives frequently think
he should be an expert in arrang-

ing their purchases to the best
possible cooling results. Often he
has to unpack and repack the
ice chamber. This is the only
standing cause of delayed service."

"The delivery systems are be-
