At Healy, camp tender for Oscar Jacobson, while handling a line of six animals, had an accident along the Buck creek ridge driveway. BRAZIL SCRAP IS DESPERATE

Americans Believe Thousand Have Been Killed in Rebel-Federal Clashes.

SANTOS, Brazil (By the Associated Press) — Fighting in Sao Paulo has been most desperate during the past few days, according to two employees of an American concern who arrived today after a perilous journey aboard from the beleaguered metropolis. They estimated the dead would reach 2000.

The luxurious Hotel Esplanade at Sao Paulo has been turned into a hospital and is crowded with the wounded. Shells from besieging federal forces have been falling in the city. One shell landed on a hotel killing eight civilians. Some of the federal artillery stations south of the city have been bombarding it.

Most of the fighting between Santos and Sao Paulo has been between small bands of rebels and the federal troops. References confirm the report that 600 troops who started last week from Santos to aid in the relief of Sao Paulo were cut to pieces by insurgents.

The prisoners shared the halls from a plate covering a stove pipe hole in the main cage, then went up stairs, cut two bars in the windows with a hacksaw and swung to the ground with a rope of bed clothing.

HOME FROM CANADA TRIP

Mayor and Mrs. Merton W. Kiddle of Island City returned home last evening from a 1500-mile journey over the northwest. They went to Canada by way of Yakima and looked over an interesting part of Washington state which neither had before seen. In Vancouver, British Columbia, they spent July Fourth and attended the celebration of that great American day by the dominion folk. The mayor says that as it may seem few Canadian cars were to be observed either in the parade or on the streets, but the large procession was composed of Oregon, California and Washington cars bearing their respective state license tags.

The speaking was a little tedious at the celebration and Mayor Kiddle admitted that he felt like making a few sensible remarks on the superb merit of Hard Federation flour made from Hard Federation wheat raised in the Grande Ronde valley.

When asked how he accounted for so many Oregon, Washington and California cars being in Vancouver, British Columbia, on July 4th, the mayor said, "There apparently was a reason."

INDIANS WILL GET SUFFRAGE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Provided their reservations will set up the necessary machinery, thousands of Indians will become voters in the coming elections as a result of the Citizenship Act passed at the recent session of congress.

With the passage of the law every native born Indian in the United States automatically became a citizen. Commissioner Burke recently estimated the number at approximately 150,000. At least one-fourth of this number, it is calculated, are adults and therefore entitled to vote except in states where the election laws fix certain qualifications, such as educational, property ownership or payment of poll taxes.

Not only the Indians, in the particular circumstances described are prevented from casting their votes, but even white citizens living on the reservations have no such opportunity.

In one or two states, however, this condition is said to have been remedied by counties bordering on Indian reservations permitting the citizens in unorganized jurisdictions to cast their ballots in the adjoining counties.

More than 200,000 Indians had been made citizens before the passage of the new citizenship act and a large percentage of these are said to be placed in the similar position of not being able to vote solely because the facilities enabling them to exercise this right are not available.

partly paints and oils, with automobile accessories. Apparently the fire had gained considerable headway before its discovery at 2 o'clock, for the fire department was unable from the start to control it.

Sparks Cover Wide Area
Sparks from the burning building were spread over a wide area, and the dryness of the weather made combating the flames thus started a difficult task.

The Standard Lumber company building was the first to ignite, but this was quickly brought under control. Flames next lit on the roof of the Shurey deal garage, completely destroying the roof, but they were controlled before the interior of the building was badly damaged.

The Allen residence is seven blocks from the warehouse, and with the crowd all gathered at the warehouse it was some time before the blaze on the residence roof was discovered. By this time, it had gained such a start that practically nothing was saved.

D. W. French, local manager for the hardware company, refused Sunday night to estimate the damage to the building. While the origin of the fire was undetermined Sunday night, employees made the guess it might have started from a tire vulcanizing machine.

United States Winner In 1921 Olympic Games

the finish line inside the stadium and a deafening applause in 2 hours, 42 minutes 23.5 seconds, nearly six minutes in front of his nearest rival, Bertini of Italy, with DeMar, Baltimore, Mass., the American veteran, finishing a close third.

But remarkable as was Stenroos' triumph in the world's greatest test of heart and stamina, the highest honor of all in the final analysis must be bestowed upon his countryman, Paavo Nurmi, who completed a phenomenal record Sunday when, leading his team to victory in the 2000-meter race, he won his fourth triumph of the games.

Nurmi, flawless running machine, whose marvelous achievement in capturing four Olympic events equals the record set by the American, Kraenzlein, 24 years ago, but stands alone in comparison with any accomplishment since that time, was the mainstay of the courageous but vain fight Finland put up to out-vault the United States. The little northern country gave America one of the closest battles it has ever had, victory with a two-man team. A recapitulation shows that practically half the team's points were scored by Nurmi and William Rittola, an American running prodigy, who established the Olympic "iron man" record by competing in all eight days and breaking two records, while racing a total of 42,000 meters, equivalent to the marathon distance. Taking the three final days' events in record breaking fashion, the United States ran its final point total to 245, as compared with Finland's 166, and also gained the coveted margin in final places, with 12 to 10 for Finland.

The American relay team showed astonishing speed in capturing both the 400 and 1600-meter team events in world's record time, while "Bud" Homer, the husky Californian collegian, broke the Olympic record in winning the 400-meter race, adding his name to those of Osborne, America, and Rittola, Finland, as the only double victors to share a portion of Nurmi's glory.

Another world's record also went to America when announcement was made Sunday that Harold Osborne had won first place in the 1500-meter race and unprecedented margin of 27 to 1 and a fraction.

Relay Record Broken
The United States won the 1600-meter relay race Sunday. Sweden was second, Great Britain third, Canada fourth, France fifth and Italy sixth. Time, 3 minutes, 16 seconds.

These figures constitute a new world's record, the old record of 3 minutes, 16.2 seconds, having been made by the American relay team at the Stockholm Olympic games in 1912.

Clarence Houser, University of Southern California, won the final in the Olympic discus event with a throw of 46 meters, 155 centimeters. This mark breaks the Olympic record.

Stenroos of Finland won the Olympic marathon race, Bertini of Italy was second and Demar, United States, was third. Stenroos' time was 2 hours, 42 minutes, 23.5 seconds.

Holonen of Finland came in fourth and Plaza Reyes, Chile, sixth. Churchill, United States, finished in twenty-third position and his team mate, Mellor, in twenty-fifth.

In the 3000-meter team race the results were as follows: Nurmi, Finland, first; Rittola, Finland, second; Macdonald, Great Britain, third; Johnson, Great Britain, fourth; Katz, Finland, fifth; Kirby, United States, sixth. Time, 8 minutes, 32 seconds.

F. S. Takes 400-Meter Run
The final in the 400-meter relay race was won by the United States. Great Britain was second, Holland third, Hungary fourth, France fifth and Switzerland sixth. Time, 41 seconds.

By running the distance in this time the Americans clipped off 1.5 of a second from their own world's record made 24 hours previously.

Pirgerio of Italy won the final in the 10,000 meter walk. Good, Sweden, was second, followed by Macdonald, South Africa, was third; Pader, Italy, fourth; Schwab, Switzerland, fifth; and Clark, Great Britain, sixth. The winner's time was 47 minutes, 49 seconds. Hinkley, United States, finished ninth. The United States was eliminated.

The United States will meet in the semi-finals Tuesday.

The United States crew won the first heat of the elimination trials in the four-oared shells with coxswains from Belgium and Spain in the Olympic regatta, which opened on the Seine river Sunday.

Others qualifying were France, who defeated England and Poland; Italy who won from Hungary and Holland by defeating Switzerland; The United States, France, Italy, by France in the water polo competition by a score of 5 goals to 1 in the final Tuesday.
