OLIVANY IS NEW TAMMANY HEAD

NEW YORK (AP)—Tammany Hall Monday chose in general session Judge George Oliver as its new head, grand chief to succeed the late Charles F. Murphy, and voted its "undivided and loyal support" to the Davis-Bryan ticket and the "progressive and forward looking platform" of the national democratic party.

The vote for Judge Olivany before it was made unanimous by the 38 men and women representatives of 23 districts was reported to have been 22-3-13 for Martin G. (Marty) McInerney.

"The call is too strong to resist," Judge Olivany told the executive committee of Tammany Hall after he had been escorted to the "fourteenth street wigwam" by two veterans of the organization—a man and a woman, both gray haired. Surrogate James A. Foley, grand chief last May, immediately after Murphy's death, had accepted and then on the advice of physicians, had declined the post.

HOME STATE GREET'S BRYAN

LINCOLN, Neb. (By the Associated Press)—Governor Charles Bryan Monday night was ready to resume the task of the governorship following a day given over to a rousing reception by fellow Nebraskans who welcomed him home from New York, where he was nominated by the Democrats as the running mate of John W. Davis, the party candidate for the presidency.

Laying aside partisan politics for the time being residents of Omaha, where the governor at one time conducted a clear store, and of Lincoln, where he served as mayor, and city commissioner, gave him an enthusiastic welcome as thousands participated. Various shades of political opinion were represented. Civic and other organizations joined in the program.

mining towns and cities of Idaho and Montana, and in the growing cities of the Inland Empire between the Rocky and Cascade mountains. And the surplus should come, can readily and cheaply find the open markets of the world.

"Though the conditions will be excellent for fruit growing it is not expected that this project will be extensively planted to orchards. The plan is to make it suitable to dairy producers, stock growers and growers of products especially suited to canneries and evaporators.

"The nation's need of this and other meritorious projects is inherent. Secretary of the Interior Work has truly said that 'One summer's drought such as occurred in the memory of those now living would put this most prosperous country in want.'

"The country's need is better balanced agriculture, not restricted production of food. The nation needs increased production and larger consumption of these wholesome products. We import constantly enormous quantities of foreign sugar. The need is increased production of best sugar.

"Even now, in time of peace and with present population, heavy imports of foreign foods are needed to feed our people. It is in the part of statehood to consider carefully the situation that will be presented 10 or 15 years from now when 15,000,000 or 20,000,000 more people will be calling for food.

"Population increases while the public domain dwindles. The arable land is being used. Broadly speaking, there are no more lands left to be taken. The increased production the nation must have.

"These are facts that should be surveyed and weighed by the American people and the government at Washington. If there shall be vision of statehood in the future at the national capital, as there has been statehood vision in the past, congress and the administration will not permit a suspension or flagging of western reclamation."

URGING SUPPORT FOR IRRIGATION IN THE STATE

Denying that they are fighting for a lost cause Harry Gard, of Madras, and George Huntington Currey of Arlington, are spending today in Baker urging crystallization of sentiment in the Deschutes project. The Deschutes project is the one closest to the hearts of these two well informed gentlemen of Oregon affairs in general, and irrigation in particular.

They argue that the Deschutes project can be built by private money provided progress can be reported insofar as the state is concerned. That means the state will guarantee the interest on Deschutes bonds for five years and play the program according to the present statutes.

It seems that Governor Pierce is not entirely in accord with the Deschutes project and therein lies a danger of the whole works falling into the discard. Harry Gard insists if the Deschutes project is put through with private money the federal aid to irrigation in eastern Oregon will go to the other projects now slated.
