Praying, Singing and Breaching. Not Enough, Say Ministers.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—The moral status of Birmingham, one of the foremost of the manufacturing towns of Great Britain, was severely attacked by the Rev. T. Edmunds in an address at the opening session of the conference of the West Midlands Baptist association here.

"Birmingham," the speaker said, "is a pagan city with industry, ignorance, drunkenness, squalor, violence in its midst which create a desperate need for social service. If the Christian church is to be of real beneficent service," he argued, "we will have to do more than sing, pray, preach and teach."

Rev. J. Leslie Brown, of Walla Walla, declared at the conference that he was "honed stiff" with preaching. What was the good of preaching when present conditions existed, he asked. He said he believed that many of the church leaders were on the wrong lines, and asked if they had any idea of what they were talking about and serving at.

Automobiles Seem Cheap When Bought on This Basis.

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. (AP)—Automobiles are being sold here by the pound. An enterprising dealer who handles a low-priced car, now advertises his wares at 33 1/2c a pound. His advertisements set forth the weight of the cars, together with the total price at so much a pound, and compare the price with that per pound of every day necessities of life.

It is said the unique method of advertising has proved unusually successful.

Loat Found on Irish Farms.

DUBLIN (AP)—The Free State elvic guards have raided a number of farmhouses in county Londonderry and discovered in them many articles of antique silverware bearing the crest of the Macleod-War family. They were looted from Curraghmore which was destroyed by fire. This was the home of Field Marshall Sir Henry Wilson, the British army chief of staff in the European war who was assassinated on his door step in London.

OLD PARTIES MAKE READY FOR ACTION

members for the campaign here he was Monday. Refreshed by a week end of rest, he returned to the city to tackle this first great problem of his contest for the presidency.

Two days of discussion with party leaders—days beginning for the campaign at 11 a. m. and ending near midnight—had failed to bring about a selection, or at any rate a selection that brought acceptance. Mr. Davis, in a brief meeting with newspaper men Tuesday night, expressed regret that he could announce no settlement in regard to the most important phase of party organization. He was asked whether he favored having a national chairman and a campaign manager as combining the two offices, and replied that even on that point he was not ready to express himself.

Confers With Leaders. Daniel C. Hooper of New York, Cordell Hull of Tennessee, the present national chairman, Norman E. Mack, who has been New York's national committeeman for 24 years, having just been elected for the seventh term, George Whitte of Ohio, who directed the Cox campaign; Clem Shaver of West Virginia, and Normal H. Davis, former undersecretary of state, joined Mr. Davis before luncheon and spent most of the day with him.

The task of picking a leader of the organization is made all the more delicate by the need of smoothing out the difficulties within the party that the sharp struggle over platform and nomination intensified.

His attention having been devoted so far mainly to choice of a manager, Mr. Davis' address of acceptance has not yet reached the stage of formulation. He has discussed with his advisers and considered the theme and scope of it, but does not expect to begin writing his speech until he settles the building organization question and withdraws to the Maine coast.

Expect to Reach Home Soon. The date of the landing of the aviators on American shores now depends on the arrival of supplies in Greenland. Owing to the high prices demanded by Scandinavian ship owners to transfer gasoline to about 450 miles.

STUART MACLAREN MAY BE LOST NEAR RIBLES. TOKIO (By Associated Press)—As Stuart MacLaren, British aviator flying around the world, is six hours over due at Paramushiro Island, in the Kuriles, where he was to have landed today, a Japanese destroyer has set out in search of him, according to a report from Paramushiro.

MacLaren and two companions hopped off from Toshinoyokko, Yotorufu Island early today, without apparently favorable weather ahead. Their northward path lay over a series of comparatively uninhabited islands, a distance of about 450 miles.
