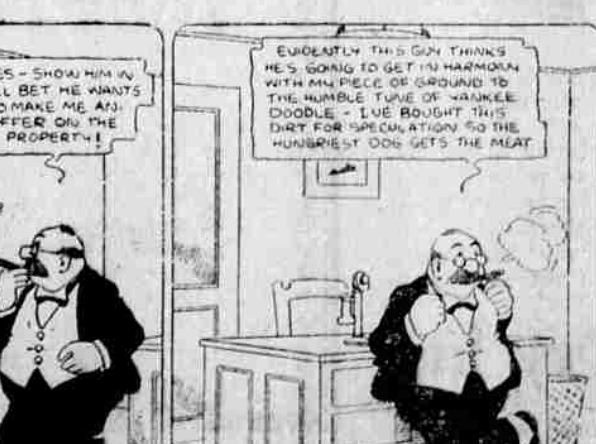
Princess Sells Art Treasures
