CONFERENCE IS TOMORROW

CORVALLIS (Special)—The agricultural committee of the Oregon Bankers association and other leading bankers will hold a conference at the Oregon Agricultural college here Friday, July 18th on the agricultural outlook and what steps bankers can take in improving the situation. D. H. Otis, director of the agricultural commission of the American Bankers association, and L. H. Russell, dean of agriculture at the University of Wisconsin, and leading authority on farmer-banker matters, will be among the speakers.

Keith Powell of Woodburn, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Oregon Bankers association, will preside, and C. L. Hulse, of the Eugene Bank of Commerce, and director of the agricultural commission of the American group of the Pacific federal reserve district, will explain the progress of the farmer-banker movement in the western states. Informal discussion will follow.

This conference winds up a series held recently in the western states constituting the twelfth district, and attended by Director Otis and Dean Russell. The first of the kind ever held in the west was convened at the college in June last year. Between these two conferences, eight states including Washington, Idaho and California have held similar meetings.

The agricultural economic conference convoked by the extension service last January received support from these bankers, who have made a careful study of the recommendations and policy then outlined and adopted.

Traffic Association Elects.—HOOVER, ILL., Ore.—The Hood River Traffic association elected officers of the valley, elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: R. W. Kelly, president; William Irwin vice president; C. H. Cantor, treasurer; and A. P. S. Steele, W. H. Woulpert, J. C. Duckwall and P. L. Tompkins, additional directors. William C. Allen was named secretary.

DRUGGISTS GOOD BOYS.—EUGENE, Ore.—Oregon druggists have given the federal prohibition enforcement officers less trouble than in any other state of the union, according to a declaration of Dr. J. A. Lavelle, prohibition commissioner, and Frank Mitchell, legal adviser for his department. Dr. Lavelle said that his department is confident that the druggists of Oregon are not selling alcohol for beverage purposes.

W. P. Sedgely, district manager of a large chain of drug stores brought out an interesting point in showing the effect of colored hair upon retail business. Women, he declared, are now buying clippers, razors, and curlers where they formerly purchased a hair comb.
