New York.—The golf coat sewer is a useful thing. It may be worn at the country club, on the links or for horseback riding—and it is worn on all these occasions.

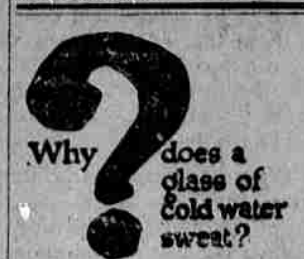
Cities Asked for Right of Way.
