Arrangements with the O. W. R. R. & N. company fix the rates at 35 cents a hundred pounds, or \$7.50 a ton. "Truck rates over the highway are reported to be \$12 a ton and by express, \$12.50.

The railroad car may be used by any one or a number of shippers and will go forward each evening whether entirely or partially filled.

Grass Fire in Hermiston.

HERMISTON, Ore.—Losses from grass fires are becoming heavy the last two weeks. Lately they have been of almost daily occurrence. George Baneroff, local bee man, made a trip to his apiary on the old Walter Lloyd place preparatory to placing some new supers on the hives there. He concluded to burn off an accumulation of rubbish near the yard and started a fire. The flames quickly spread and were almost immediately past control. Calls for help were answered, but before it could be gotten under control it had burned over the bee yard destroying much of the stand. A car loaded with supers was saved by running the car through the flames to safety. Mr. Baneroff estimates that his loss on the bees, hives and honey will run over \$500.

DOUBLES POLICE FORCE

SALEM, Ore.—A wave of burglary that has descended on Salem in recent weeks caused the city council to meet in a special session and double the night police force. It was found that under the city charter funds for the purpose could be transferred from another department. The action followed a meeting of business men earlier in the day, who appealed to the council to enlarge the force. Included in recent crimes here have been skylight intrusions into mercantile buildings, some of which netted the burglar several thousand dollars' worth of loot.

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)—Information that caused his own arrest was given by V. C. Fleming, deputy county auditor, to a forest ranger here recently when the ranger came in from his forest station and went to the courthouse seeking to find who owned an automobile bearing a certain license number.

GROWING OF BEETS PROVES SUCCESS

BEND, Ore.—The fifteen plots of beets planted in this district as an experiment to prove the value and practicality of the crop in Central Oregon, are progressing

well and the raisers are greatly encouraged, according to W. T. McDonald, county agent for the Oregon Agricultural college. Three cultivations have been made, the beets thinned and indications are for a big crop. It will be plentiful McDonald stated. The alfalfa is free from weeds and there is a better stand than last year. Dairymen are increasing in central Oregon, McDonald declared. Two carloads of dairy cows were imported into Deschutes county during this one month.

Expert testimony
