FIELD PEAS A NEW PROSPECT

If some day eastern Oregon wheat land will need to grow a leguminous crop to aid in restoring soil fertility, field peas will likely be the crop grown. Oats on the production of field peas presented in Bulletin No. 294 of the Oregon Experiment station show that this crop has given very satisfactory results at the three branch experiment stations in eastern Oregon located at Moro, Union and Burns. At Moro where the average rainfall is less than 12 inches the crop is grown in cultivated rows. At Union under more favorable conditions the peas are sown in drills like wheat. At Burns on dry land the field pea crop has not proved very successful because of injury by red spiders. Under irrigation at Burns, however, field peas produce profitable yields.

Experiments to determine the value of this crop for pasture for hogs and sheep have been carried on at the stations with very satisfactory results. Feeding experiments at the Union station show that peas have a higher feed value than the grains. In the experiments at Moro the best varieties have been O'Rourke, Lima and White Canada. At Union White Canada has given the best results. At Burns, under irrigation the Kaiser variety has proved to be the highest yielding.

ladies before the audience would let them leave the stage. Continued applause followed their exit and they were compelled to return and render "Swanee River." Mrs. A. K. Many an old pioneer cast his eyes downward as the word of the song floated out in cool crisp air for it brought to him mind the sweet moments of youth. Her encore selection was a delightful catchy number describing the scant clothes of present day women.

Dunham Wright, one of the stalwart pioneers, delivered the opening address. In his well chosen language and with firm and eloquent delivery Mr. Wright reviewed the country briefly as he found out, told of the test of nerve for every pioneer who stayed, complimented the advance

ment which has come in his lifetime and then dwelt at length upon the needed contentment in the mind of every person. "We are apt to face our problems too seriously," said the speaker, "and let me admonish you that the sweetest thing in life for either old or young is contentment. Contentment that brings happiness to the soul, that relieves the mind and thereby harmonizes all things of life."

He was followed by a short talk by Bruce Dennis of the Evening Observer who spoke on the pioneer as he knew him and extended a cordial welcome to the association to meet regularly in La Grande each year.

A dinner of extraordinary merit was served at noon and while long tables were loaded with good things to eat in the pavilion many private dinners were served under the trees by pioneers to their friends. Wallowa county people turned out exceedingly along to yesterday's meeting which paved the way for a two-county meeting next year.

A song by Mrs. Sanderson, who responded to applause with an encore, was then followed by a reading and encore by Mrs. Eliza Hoffman Hill.

A group of old-time songs were sung by Helena Williamson, who appeared in appropriate costume, and M. L. Carter, the Sand Ridge poet, gave a reading and an encore.

CONDITIONAL PERMITS GIVEN

WASHINGTON (AP)—Preliminary permits for the construction of three power dams on the Klamath River, in Northwest California, on file for nearly four years were granted by the federal power commission today to the associated interests of A. F. Seybold and the Electro-Metals company, of San Francisco.

The permits were authorized on condition that the applicants work out a plan for protection of salmon in the river.

HUNTERS WILL FIGHT WOLVES

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP)—Government wolf hunters this season will again penetrate the charred lands and wage war on the bands of timber wolves which prey on the caribou herds. Last year the hunters killed off several hundred of the predatory beasts in the country northeast of Great Slave lake.

H. Loranger, who headed the first expedition, will conduct the hunting operations again this year. He is taking with him a number of men and the party will leave for the territory of the Caribou migrations by his schooner from Fort Smith, N. W. T., making his headquarters on the Lockhart river.

The caribou cross the river in millions and along this river the greatest number of wolves were killed last year. Several canoes are being constructed for the expedition.

STUDENTS AID THEMSELVES

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Students of the University of Oregon during the school year of 1923-24 earned \$46,074 for work on regular and odd-time jobs, an increase of \$3978 over the previous year, according to the report of Mrs. Charles E. Bennett, employment secretary for the University Young Men's Christian Association.

The income to students from the regular employment for the fall term was \$19,479 while the odd jobs brought the sum of \$11,979. The total for the regular jobs during the spring term was \$11,429.

During the last spring quarter the regular employment yielded a total of \$11,588 while the approximate return from odd jobs was \$11,000. They made a total of \$12,588 for the quarter.

REDUCTION IS NOT ACHIEVED

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—The Interstate Commerce Commission Thursday refused a reduction of grain rates, holding that such a reduction would be of little help to the farmers.

The benefit which would accrue to the average farmer in case of a reduction in freight rates on grain and grain products generally is small compared with the disastrous effect on certain railroad revenues and on their credit. The commission declared in their opinion on the General Grain Rate case.

The commission also held that the general basis of rates for transportation of grain, grain products and hay are not unreasonable or otherwise in violation of the interstate commerce act and the complaint was dismissed.

CHARGES DISMISSED

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal trade commission complaints against the Douglas Fire Extermination and Export company, charging an attempt to monopolize lumber export business of the Pacific coast, were dismissed late Thursday by the committee without prejudice.

IMPROVEMENT IN CAL.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Forest fires in Pacific coast states Thursday were less menacing than for many days, due to rains in Washington and Oregon and moderation of winds in California. Towns in Pend Oreille county, Washington, which have been in danger from the flames, were reported to be no longer threatened.

In California the situation was declared to be the best since the fires started. Six big fires were burning, but all were said to be under control except that at McKinney creek, where the fighters hourly expected to gain the upper hand.

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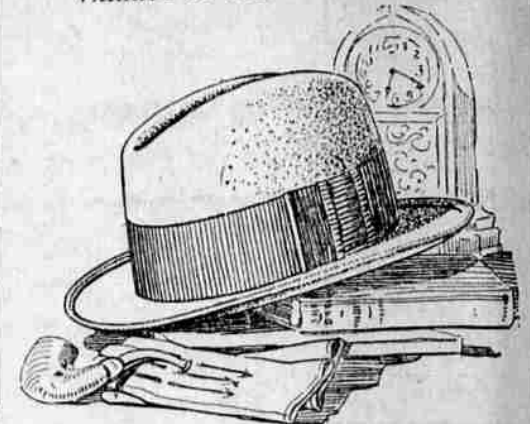
