Wheat closed at \$1.24 7-8 1/2 and the December grade at \$1.27 3-4. July corn closed at \$1.02 compared with \$1.12 3-4 Thursday, while September grades ended at \$1.04 1-2 and \$1.04, and December at \$2.83-3.

Predile \$1.50 Wheat.

Arthur W. Cutler, Chicago wheat dealer, who was reported to have made more than \$1,500,000 in a clean up on corn this week, said Friday that he believed wheat would reach \$1.50 before the crop year ends. He bought corn on his prediction last spring that it would go to a dollar a bushel before the end of July and made a fortune when it sold above that figure. He said that weather conditions have retarded the Canada crop of wheat and added that this means that Europe must depend on the United States for much of its wheat.

"There has been plenty of talk to the effect that political influence is back of the bull market in wheat," he said. "I say that this is all bunk. The political agitators at Washington for three years tried to legislate prices upward, but without success. The only way to put wheat higher is to buy it in the pit."

Mr. Ramsdell points out that the Mill Creek watershed is of extreme importance to the community of Oreg. as a source of water supply, and also in connection with the Eastern Oregon Light and Power plant situated thereon. Already this season one fire has been started on the north fork of Mill Creek by careless campers which might have run to disastrous proportions. The extreme dry season has called for exceptional precautions and the government is prepared to enforce the permit and no-smoking and no-fire regulations to the limit, as evidenced by the recent case tried before Federal Judge Root at Portland. In this case Thomas Curry, a truck driver from Lane county was sentenced to 30 days in jail for smoking in a closed area of the Cascade National Forest. "The forest service," says Mr. Ramsdell, "desires the hearty cooperation of 30 per cent of the public who often suffer severe restrictions in smoking or the carelessness or willfulness of the other 70 per cent."
