

AMERICANS SUPREME IN ATHLETICS

night a more substantial feat in the Olympic point battle. The Americans, with 12 branches of the Olympic competing ends, have a total of 58 points.

Great Britain, which has displaced Finland in second place, has 33 points. France, owing to her fencing victory, has jumped ahead of the Finns for third place, with 26 points each, while Sweden is next with 22.

The United States has captured seven championships and is certain to add an eighth to its list when the tennis tournament closes Monday.

COLOMBES, France (By the Associated Press)—The two young American tennis stars, Alton Hagedorn and Vincent Richards, captured the Olympic singles Sunday and clinched another brilliant international team triumph for the United States.

Miss White, playing with the calm and steady assurance which marked her victorious progress all week, decisively vanquished Miss. Emilienne Viano, a French girl of Greek parentage, in the women's final, 6-2, 6-2. But Richards was forced to battle through a heated and exciting match under a broiling sun to take the measure of his young French rival, Henri Cochet, 6-4, 6-7, 4-6, 6-2, for the men's title. A crowd of more than 5000 sweltering in the heat was stirred to high enthusiasm by the two Franco-American contests. While their sympathies naturally were with the losers, the spectators, with a few scattered exceptions, applauded the youthful contestants impartially and cheered the Americans enthusiastically when the final points were won and lost in each match.

The two mixed doubles teams, Mrs. Jessup and Richards and Mrs. Wightman and R. Norris Williams, emerged victorious from their semi-finals Sunday afternoon and will stage an all-American battle for the title tomorrow, while Richards and Francis T. Hunter will seek the men's doubles honors against the French stars, Cochet and Brugnon.

By Sunday's achievements the United States now has 30 points which, with the assurance of at least 20 more Monday, sufficient to eclipse the total of any rival. France is nearest with 26 points and Great Britain next with 15.

W. S. WINS BOXING TITLE PARIS (By the Associated Press)—The United States Sunday night won the boxing championship of the Olympic games.

During the final battle the big crowd in the velodrome thrived to a high pitch of excitement which at one time assumed the proportion of a riot.

Walter LaBarba, Los Angeles A. C., won the final in the fly weight class on points from Mackenzie of Great Britain.

Smith of South Africa defeated R. J. Tripoli, Yonkers, N. Y., on points in the bantamweight class. In the final of the featherweight class Jack Biles, Los Angeles, defeated Joe Sides, Los Angeles, on points.

In the final of the lightweight class Neilson of Denmark defeated the champion of Argentina, on points.

The welter championship was won by De Lorge of Belgium, who defeated Menez of Argentina, on points.

The United States finished with 25 points; Great Britain, 20; Denmark 20; Argentina, 16; Belgium, 12; Norway, 14; France and Canada, each 7; Italy, 6; and Sweden and Holland, 3 each.

AMERICANS SWEEP SWIMMING EVENTS

LES TOURELLES, France (By the Associated Press)—In the final of the 100-meter swim, free style, Johnny Weismuller, Illinois A. C., won. His time was 59 seconds flat which breaks the Olympic record. Duke Kahanamoku, Los Angeles A. C., was second.

The final in the 100-meter free style for women, was won by Ethel Lackie, Illinois A. C., her time, 1:12 1/2 seconds.

The United States also won the final in the 500-meter relay race and established a world record. The time was 9 minutes 23 2/5 seconds. Austria was second with 10 minutes 2 1/2 seconds; Sweden was third, Japan fourth, and Great Britain fifth.

completed several days ago, but no announcement was made and with the exception of the secret service men, no one was present during the visit of the president and his family.

Left "High and Dry." Returning to the river, which is a series of incidents began which had not been arranged. An outgoing tide had made it impossible for any of the Mayflower's small boats to approach near enough to shore to take the party aboard and the president of the United States literally was left "high and dry."

The nearest landing that could be used was at Colonial Beach, a summer resort, and there the president and his family went by automobile, while the Mayflower stampered up the river. The visit to the beach town was unexpected and it was not until the yacht anchored and a launch put off

that those ashore realized the solitary automobile standing near the entrance to the bathing pier contained the president.

Crowd Gathers Quickly. As soon as the news was flashed about, however, Mr. Coolidge's car was surrounded and nearly a thousand persons managed to reach the pier before the party could get aboard the launch. The president received quite an ovation and stood in the small boat waving his hat as it sped out to the Mayflower.

Despite the unexpected delays, the party arrived aboard the Mayflower in time for the Sunday services which the president has ordered to be conducted on the yacht by a naval chaplain whenever he spends a Sabbath on board.

The Mayflower Sunday night was anchored about 20 miles above the river, with orders to not under way on the return trip in time to bring the president back to Washington about 8 o'clock Monday morning.

LAMP PRICES TO SAVE CONSUMERS' GIANTIC SUM

Along with other numerous instances to the effect that commodity prices are going downward comes the announcement of the General Electric company of a 16 per cent reduction in the price of incandescent lamps.

Officials of the company announced that this latest reduction is the fifth in twenty-seven months and the second since February of this year and they report that it brings lamp prices 27 per cent below 1914 figures. Officials estimate that this reduction means a saving to the public of over \$7,000,000 annually.
