TRAGEDIES EXPOSED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (Special)—Thousands of tragedies arising out of the world war were brought to light by the passage of the Adjusted Compensation Law. It declared an official of the National headquarters of the legion here. The official explained:

"I refer to those tragedies in which veterans have been chosen to disappear since returning safely from France, rather than to carry back to the old associations, their disappointed hopes, their restless spirits, their disgraced bodies. The compensation law reveals the cases of thousands of such 'missing' men whose families cannot collect their compensation benefits under the ruling which states that dependents or veterans must submit with their application a certificate of the veteran's death."

"The official records in the army and navy departments report these men as 'missing.' Records are not discerning. Most of the veterans listed as 'missing' are dead to their families and old associations, as if their bodies lay unidentified in France."

"Somewhere the flesh of these missing men still lives, it is true, but their spirit is broken or has taken hopeless flight like a bird with a broken wing, fluttering frightened from one gray obscurity to the next, there to hide, hurr and quiver, hoping that man will not step on it, nor injure it further while it awaits for death as a relief. But the government compensates only on a death certificate. Broken and crushed spirits are not compensative."

"Take just one case that comes to mind. In the hellish days of 1917 a young girl said goodbye and gave a promise of faithfulness to a handsome boy. The ensuing events were not uncommon. France, St. Mihiel, a piece of spinning shrapnel, a mangled clot of blood and thunder then the girl turned home with all that was left of the pleasing features smashed and horrible and not less horrible when placed together by the clumsy hands of man. The girl had been faithful. Then the meeting, and the soldier's twisted visage that contorted into a hideous leering grimace when it had meant to smile the tenderness in the boy's heart; then the girl's involuntary revulsion from that loathing thing. The man noted the horror reflected in the girl's eyes—and the averted face. He hastily mumbled goodbye as he stumbled through the garden. The boy has never returned."

"On the records of the war department that boy is listed as 'missing.' As a missing veteran his compensation cannot be paid his people until he is proven dead, or unless he returns to claim it. He will never return to face the constant pity and sympathy of those he had loved. His case is similar to the tragedies of thousands of other veterans, singled with the brand of war in one form or another, and who will in all probability wander until the end, never to be seen."

LONDON (Special)—Colonel H. D. Lindsay, past national commander of the American Legion upon his arrival in London recently addressed members of the British Legion on the fraternal relations between the British and American Legions. He declared: "The greatest benefit was derived from the war is that bond of sympathy which has sprung up between the men in England and the United States who actually fought in the war. Those two big bodies of war veterans, spread as they are throughout the towns and villages of the two countries, will be able to do more towards a general peace than anything else. The League of Nations, in my opinion, will not become more than the forum from which the inspirations of peace will be voiced."

LORAIN, Ohio (Special)—The victims of the recent tornado disaster here are being assisted by the Ohio department of the American Legion working through the agency of the local post.

Legionnaires of Lorain and Elletts were active immediately after the disaster in searching for bodies, salvaging valuables and relieving distress where ever it was found.

A bulletin has been issued from the Ohio department headquarters of the legion requesting that all legion and auxiliary units in the state contribute money, clothing, provisions, and to arouse the public to the relief of Lorain.

HILAS, Hawaii (Special)—The high schools of Hilo, which heretofore have been without directed physical education, will be provided with expert instructors from the United States largely due to the action of the American Legion here.

It was recently called to the attention of the American Legion by the Matine Koa Athletic Council, Samuel Woods, commissioner of West Hawaii, and W. E. Givens, superintendent of the board of education, that supervised physical education was needed in Hilo high schools. The legion at once enlisted its aid in the project with the result that the coming year will find husky Americans directing the youth of Hilo in their "daily games."

BOSTON, Mass. (Special)—According to the report of the legislative committee of the American Legion, department of Massachusetts, it cost the department just one dollar for lobby expenses in support of seven legion sponsored measures passed by the last session of the state legislature.

Pear Tommage Is Contracted.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—The Apple Growers' association, according to an announcement of General Manager Steele, has contracted the season's Bartlett pear tomage of its members to canners. Pears will be allowed to remain on trees seven to nine days longer, where sold to canners. Pears to go to canners must be of uniform size in diameter or larger, smooth and well formed.

Notice of Hearing On Proposed Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon proposes and intends to improve Improvement District No. 143 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon; that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 20th day of July, 1924, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the Commission Room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any person or persons against said proposed improvement and the proposed assessment therefor against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.

That the boundaries of the district to be improved and benefited by the said proposed improvement are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the center of the intersection of Adams Avenue and Spruce Street in the City of La Grande, Oregon; thence north easterly along the center line of Spruce Street One Hundred Sixty (160) feet; thence southeasterly along a line One Hundred Sixty (160) feet from and parallel to the center line of Adams Avenue to the most easterly line of Tract "Q" Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon; thence northerly along the said most easterly line of Tract "Q" Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, a distance of Ten (10) feet; thence southeasterly along a line One Hundred Seventy (170) feet from and parallel to the center line of Adams Avenue to the most westerly line of Tract "U" Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon; thence northerly along said most westerly line of Tract "U" Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Oregon, a distance of Eighty Five (85) feet; thence southeasterly along a line Two Hundred Fifty Five (255) feet from and parallel to the center line of Adams Avenue to the center of Willow Street; thence southeasterly along the center line of Willow Street and its extension a distance of Four Hundred Fifteen (415) feet; thence northerly along a line One Hundred Sixty (160) feet from and parallel to the center line of Adams Avenue to the center of Spruce Street; thence northerly along the center line of Spruce Street One Hundred Sixty (160) feet to point of beginning, all to-wit in Coggan's, Homan's and Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon.

That said Improvement District No. 143 is hereby created by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, for the purpose of improving and with the intention to improve said Improvement District by scarifying and rolling Adams Avenue from the present pavement on Spruce Street and by constructing therein a hard surface redress pavement fifty two (52) feet in width between curb lines and including one full street intersection and four half street intersections; also by constructing concrete curb and gutter where not in place and the necessary inlets, catch basins, etc., all on the above named street located in Coggan's, Homan's and Coggan's Second Addition to the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, the cost of the above named improvements to be assessed to the property especially benefited thereby, excepting an eight foot (8) strip in the center of Adams Avenue between Willow and Spruce Streets and through each intersection, said eight foot (8) strip to be paid out of the General Fund of said City in accordance with Ordinance 591 Series 1924. Said portion of Adams Avenue being a part of the General system of the Oregon State Highway designated as the Old Oregon Trail" and affords an outlet from the limits of said City and adjoining State Highway.
