BALL, COMEDY DO NOT MIX

So Thinks Casey Stengel of the Boston Braves, Fans Won't Take Him Seriously.

NEW YORK (AP)—Casey Stengel, veteran outfielder of the Boston Braves, has come to the conclusion that it does not pay to attempt to mix comedy with baseball. Because he has done that every thing in the major league for many years, the fans now refuse to take him seriously no matter how hard he tries or how occasionally he performs, and he is one of the most conscientious and reliable players in the game.

"Comedy pays well on the stage," said Casey recently, "but it doesn't get you anything in baseball. It's nice to make the fans laugh once in a while but the player who does so finds he can't do anything else with them, no matter how hard he's trying. They don't take him seriously and the consequence is they never give him as much credit as he deserves or things he does."

Fans are indulgent of the baseball comedian's pranks only to a limited extent, according to Stengel. In proof of this statement the Braves' outfielder related a personal experience of his Philadelphia days. The Phillies were playing the Giants, and the relative standing of the two teams was about the same as it is at present.

In the particular game to which Stengel referred the Giants were leading by an overwhelming margin and Casey decided he would inject a little humor into the uninteresting contest. When he walked to the plate he took a long look across a line straight at Stengel in the right field. Casey pretended not to see the ball and did not make a move to catch it until it was almost upon him. Just as it reached him he stuck out his gloved hand and snared it.

"I thought that would make the boys laugh," Casey commented, "but all I have done is get hit in the right field and yelling, 'You big ham! Cut out that comedy and play ball! That's what's the matter with this ball club. It's so full of comedians there ain't any room on it for ball players.'"

U. S. SURE TO HELP EUROPE

Americans Pledged to World Peace, Asserts Charles Evans Hughes.

LONDON (AP)—Charles Evans Hughes, the American secretary of state, whom the Prince of Wales referred to as visiting England inognito, delivered a speech as president of the American Bar association at the Victoria dinner Monday night, interpreting American ideas and explaining the part the United States could be expected to take in European affairs.

"The dominant note of the secretary's address was that America's devotion to the cause of peace could be counted upon as well as America's purpose to co-operate with Great Britain and others in every way congenial with American institutions in the interest of peace. "For the economical rehabilitation of Europe dependence could be put on American assistance and," added the secretary, "it does not matter that this aid is not given by the government."

Dawes Plan Stressed. He laid stress on the Dawes plan and the participation of American experts with the liberty of constructive effort and declared: "I believe that the Dawes plan opens the path of confidence and prosperity. For that reason we are deeply interested in its prompt explanation."

DEMPSEY HURT IN CAR WRECK

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Jack Dempsey's famous right arm, the one that contributed so heavily to his world heavyweight pugilistic crown is out of commission, following an automobile accident Sunday night, according to attending physicians.

The fighter's list of injuries received in the automobile smashup at San Juan Capistrano, south of here, include: Dislocated right elbow, strained ligaments in neck, abrasions on right knee, cut on scalp.

Dempsey will be confined to his room for several days, the physicians said. The champion admits he escaped death by a "miracle" when his heavy sedan, carrying himself and two or three friends, was side-swiped by a speeding motorist, who continued going after he had hit the Dempsey car from the highway into the ditch.

"It was winner's luck, that's all," Dempsey remarked.

The party in the wrecked automobile, including a man and woman who gave their names as "Mr. and Mrs. Lee," were taken to the Santa Ana hospital and later came on to Los Angeles.

GIANTS AND SOX TO TOUR

CINCINNATI (AP)—Permission to tour Europe was granted the New York Giants and Chicago White Sox Monday by Commissioner K. M. Landis, Manager John J. McGraw of the New York team announced here.

The trip abroad by the two teams has been technically agreed upon some time ago, but consent of the baseball command was held up pending a vote of the members of both leagues. The vote, Mr. McGraw said, was unanimously in favor of the proposed tour.

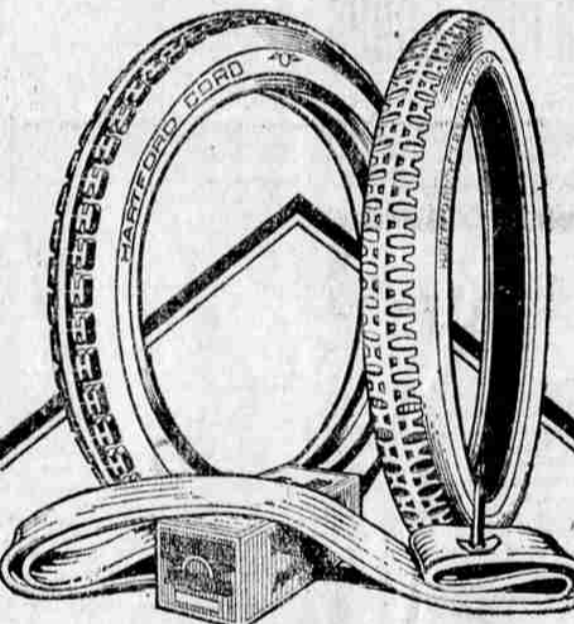
