Women Unchanged from Ancient to Modern Time

ODESSA, Russia. (AP)—One hundred and sixty ancient Greek tombs of striking design and rare archaeological interest have been unearthed in the dead city of Olyvia, near here, by Professor Semenov-Soumarok.

Among the articles found in the tombs was a small linen bag containing a lady's mirror and believed to be the forerunner of the present day vanity case. In the bag there also were a rouge stick for the lips and a charcoal pencil for the eyes. The bag was found in a female grave together with tufts of false hair and a number of silver bracelets, ear rings, beads and other jewels.

In other tombs were recovered pottery of exquisite workmanship, multicolored vases, amulets, knives and various articles of bronze and copper, all in a perfect state of preservation.

The excavations, which have been in progress for many months, thus far have yielded more than 1700 articles of surpassing antiquarian interest.

Olyvia, which means "Berry," was once a center of Greek learning, culture and trade and it flourished about 500 B. C. Later it became known among Russians as the "Pompeii" of the Black sea.

MASSONS PLAN BUILDING

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—The grand lodge of Masons of Louisiana has announced that an 18-story building will be erected here. The building will cost \$2,500,000 and will be built on the present site of its temple in the heart of the business district. Construction will begin October 1.

WALLOWA MAN IS APPOINTEE

E. A. Tulley Named as Deputy State Dairy and Food Commissioner.

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—With the appointment of E. A. Tulley to the position of Deputy Dairy and Food commissioner, Wallowa loses a life-long resident. During his forty-two years in this community he has made many friends who, though pleased with the excellent position which he has received, are regretful that the popular family shall be numbered among the former residents, and hopeful that they may return. Mr. Tulley left Wednesday to take his new position. Thursday, Mrs. Tulley and son Kenneth will live at their cabin on Bear creek for six weeks until the opening of college, when Kenneth will enter O. A. C. The Tulley home will be occupied by J. W. Hughes and family.

Mr. Tulley's new position, to which he was appointed July 1st by Dairy and Food Commissioner J. D. Mickle, includes the inspection of Portland bakeries, and the testing of commercial grains and feeds. Seven years ago he completed a five year incumbency in the department, although his position as traveling deputy was not his post as his present office. New Air Mail Route Designation Expected

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—The postoffice department is considering placing in operation another transcontinental air mail route, later K. Bell, special assistant to the postmaster general, in charge of the traffic division of the air mail service, announced here Saturday. The proposed route, according to Bell, will proceed as does the present one from New York to Cleveland, but at this point it will branch off to the south, passing through Akron, O., to Indianapolis, thence to St. Louis and Kansas City, Mo., to Garden City, Kan., and to Denver. At this point it will follow the natural southern route over the mountain passes.

Rees Amby Bridge Workers.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Steel crews working on the Waukena intermediate bridge spanning the Columbia between here and White Salmon, Wash., were started today when a big swarm of bees swooped down and settled over an upright girder joined a horizontal. The steel men are considered the nerveiest of skilled workmen, but they gave the unwelcome insects a wide berth.

BUILDING IS STAYING PUT

While activity in most industries has been on the decline during the last several months, that in the building industry has held up remarkably well and promises to continue to do so during the rest of the season. Some authorities predict a more or less extensive let-up in construction operations in the cities during the fall, but a corresponding increase in rural building, as a result of good crops and fair prices prevailing on farm products. The lumber industry therefore looks forward to a steady demand, and in view of the comparatively low and broken state of stocks, expects higher prices, says the American Lumberman, Chicago.

Current demand, the only fair, shows encouraging improvement over three weeks ago, and there is every indication that a further increase is to be expected. Retailers continue to buy cautiously, on a hand-to-mouth basis, but their orders are somewhat larger and more frequent and trade from this source totals a considerable volume. Most of this business continues to come from the cities, but country yards, more confident as a result of the improved agricultural outlook, are also more often heard from. The political scare having passed, there is more confidence evident throughout the business world, and the result is somewhat larger operations and better buying in a number of directions. There has consequently been some recent improvement in industrial demand for lumber, and there is no doubt that this upward trend will continue.

Lumber output meanwhile is lower than during the first six months of the year, due to curtailment in all producing sections, especially by smaller mills that have found it impossible to operate at the present low price levels. The larger mills generally are running, but usually on curtailed basis, and little lumber is being piled. Stocks of Southern pine are fair but rather broken. Those of Douglas fir are negligible, and while western pine stocks of some items are heavy, production lately has been brought below the order line, so that a gradual reduction in mill holdings and a consequent strengthening of prices are looked for. Southern hardwoods are in fair supply, but here also there has been an elimination of a large percentage of small mill production on account of recent unfavorable market conditions, while there has been an expansion in both export and domestic demand. Northern hardwoods are scarce, and some manufacturers look for an actual shortage this fall.

Lumber prices meanwhile show general strengthening, and the mills are declining to make concessions on the former scale or to sell ahead at present prices.

Bridges To Be Repaired.

EUGENE, Ore.—A Lane county bridge crew will start work reuniting all the bridges on the Willamette highway between Revere and Oakridge and people traveling over the highway will be inconvenienced to a considerable extent, according to O. S. Callison, county bridge foreman, who will have charge of the work. He said the work probably will require a week's time and that drivers of cars planning to make the trip over the highways may expect to experience delays.

Pickle Factory Being Built.

ALBANY, Ore.—W. C. Cassidy, representative of the California Packing company, has started construction work on the pickle factory in this city. The building will be 30 feet wide by 120 feet long and will be completed in about three weeks.

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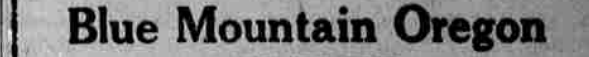


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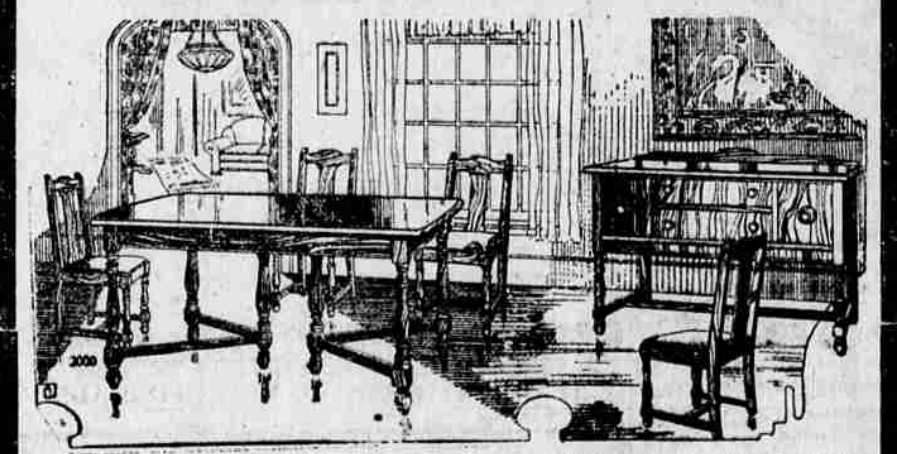
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
