OCEAN AIR IS NOW CHARTERED

FREDERICHSHAVEN, Germany (AP)—Virtually every admirer of the Atlantic over which the ZR-3 is likely to fly in her trip from this port to Lakerhurst, N. J., possibly some time in August or September, has been chartered by meteorologists employed by the Zeppelin company here. The task has taken many months, and the investigators have examined records of atmospheric phenomena covering a period of 25 years. The results of their labors have been tabulated in chart form, arranged so as to be easily read by the dirigible navigators, and are considered an invaluable asset for the pilots who will have the past performance of the weather and climate to refer to during the voyage.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, who will pilot the big ship to America, expects to return to Germany after the trip to continue his work here. Captain Ernest A. Lehmann, one of the ZR-3 navigating officers who will make the flight, will remain in the United States, as will some of the other expert members of the crew.

It was announced recently that the initial trial flight could not possibly be made before the latter part of August or early in September owing to decision of the officials to scrap the crank cases of the Maybach motors and replace them with new ones.

When completed, the officials contend, the ZR-3 will have its driving power five engines superior to those of any other aircraft ever built, and fully capable of making the great non-stop hop from Friedrichshaven, bordering on the Alps, to the lowlands of New Jersey.

HEAVY WHEAT YIELD CLAIMED

ONTARIO, Ore.—L. Eakus, near Adrain, Ore., Malheur county, reports to L. R. Brethaupt, county agent, that some of his Federation wheat went 97.5 bushels to the acre, regarded as a phenomenal yield. He says that the grain wheat has not yet been threshed, but that "it looks terribly good." Mr. Eakus is one of the first farmers to try Federation wheat in Malheur county, according to Mr. Brethaupt, and each year has obtained good yields but none ever approaching the yield this season. The wheat was sown on ground which formerly had been cropped to lettuce. Last year Mr. Eakus sold his entire crop for seed after he had secured a certified rating. The crop just threshed passed the field inspection made by E. E. Jackson, crop specialist of Oregon agricultural college extension service. The Oats variety is being tested on a number of farms, according to Mr. Brethaupt, to gain a comparison with Federation. About three-fourths of the wheat this year in Malheur county is of the Federation variety, which not only seems to be of heavier yield, but produces high quality grain.

MOVIES BLAMED FOR CRIME WAVE IN TAHITI ISLE

PAPEETE, Tahiti (AP)—Motion picture films depicting violent deeds of handsome bandits, arousing great excitement among native audiences, are blamed for the mild outbreak of banditry that took place during May. Early in the month four natives, imprisoned for various offenses, took to the hills back of Papeete. They descended from time to time on raiding expeditions, directed chiefly against Chinese provision shops, unguarded clothes lines, pig pens and chicken runs. In the course of their plundering they obtained firearms and ammunition, and later their armed forays caused the death of a native among the householders of the island.

After many unavailing efforts to capture the bandits, the government organized parties of natives to search the mountains systematically. One of the parties found the four in a remote valley, but they were not subdued until one of the fugitives had been killed and another wounded.

BURIAL PLACE MARK UNVEILED

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP)—A monument was unveiled here recently over the grave of David Lennox in the old cemetery near Watson, Ore., where a 25-year search for the grave was ended a few weeks ago by its discovery.

Lennox was a friend and companion of Marcus Whitman and rode with him at the head of the great wagon train of 1843. Two grandsons, W. P. Ford, of Wharton, Texas, and M. E. White of Portland, Ore., had sought the last resting place of the pioneer for a full quarter of a century. Dr. S. R. L. Penrose of Walla Walla college, was the principal speaker at the unveiling.

Dr. Penrose in his address quoted from an interview he obtained 24 years ago from Edward H. Lennox, son of David Lennox, who when he was 16 years old, accompanied his father and Whitman across the country.

The elder Lennox was captain of the wagon train which left Westport, Mo., May 15, 1843, for Oregon. Dr. Whitman joined the train at Westport and agreed to pilot the party to the Columbia river for \$400. The Lennox party left Dr. Whitman at the Snake river and never saw him again.

The family went to western Oregon and for 27 years lived near Hillsboro. In 1870 David Lennox moved to Weston where he bought a farm. Three years later he died. The death of near relative caused his burial place to be forgotten.

MASSONS BUY CITY HOUSE

BEND, Ore.—The Masonic order has purchased a club house to be used for lodge meetings and for social purposes. The building is built of logs in a rustic style, faced on the river, and is most spacious and attractive. It was built by the Eastern club, one of the pioneer clubs of this city. The Masonic order was installed at Bend in 1901, with twelve members. The membership now is 222. There is also a chapter of Royal Arch Masons and Knights Templar here.

AUTO 'PETTING PARTY' OFFENDERS ARE FINED

EUGENE, Ore.—Two young men found with two women, one of them married and out without her husband, in a petting party on a road near Eugene were fined \$100 each in justice court. They gave their names as Henry Welch and Lee Ellis. Sheriff Frank E. Taylor has started war, he says, on roadside petting parties. Farmers are beginning to complain that the drunken shouts proceeding from parked automobiles is disturbing their sleep.

Removal Not Mandatory

SALEM, Ore.—There is no law under which candidates for public office can be compelled to remove campaign literature posted near the election polls prior to the election day. This was the substance of a legal opinion prepared here by L. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, at the request of Governor Pierce.

WILL FEATURE WATER SPORTS

LONGVIEW, Wash. (Special)—With races, surf board riding, inspection of a U. S. destroyer and the presence of Admiral H. E. Coontz, of the Pacific Fleet of the U. S. Surf board riding behind one of the speed boats is a promised feature.

Admiral Coontz, accompanied by his wife, his aide and the officers of the destroyer will be in Longview two days of the celebration and will deliver an address in Jefferson Square, August 1.

Ross Leslie. Not only La Grande people but all Eastern Oregon and other states (represented by tourists) take advantage of the respite from business offered.

The temperature in La Grande July 24, 1924, at noon, was 87 degrees above zero. Just about the same as the Grande Ronde valley has been getting most of the time during the past few weeks.

Robberies were quite popular then—as now. The following front page heads were of course followed by more detailed stories, but they are sufficient: "Train Robbers Take Valuables From S. P. Train," and "Prostitute Safe Robbed."

An article on the back page read: "Cove's last carload of cherries left for the market today, according to advices from the cherry center. Allegation is now being turned to search albums which are prolific this year."

Locals included: "M. B. Dones, Joe, Jack Peare and E. W. Pats, then toured the valley yesterday on a business trip connected with the new Elks home."

"John Gilder, superintendent of the La Grande school, is expected to arrive home tomorrow after having spent a month or more in the east, attending the N. E. A. and visiting his father in the south."

"John Spain, the champion buckaroo, is in the city today."

"Jack Stangel, a motorcycleist, and Alex Lindsay, a taxi driver, were brought up in city court today on charges of violating traffic ordinances. Each was fined \$10. Stangel for riding his motorcycle without a light

and Lindsay for speeding.

Cloud Mackey returned home July 24 from Portland, where he attended the Pacific coast shoot. Out of 145 contestants Mr. Mackey averaged 12th high among the amateurs and beat 11 professionals.

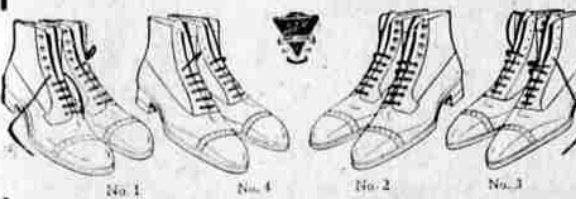
