LONDON, (AP)—In the central hall of the law courts there are staircases which wind round large pillars leading to corridors and galleries in which are various court rooms. Few people climbing them are aware that the huge pillars also contain specially built secret stairways for bringing down people who make themselves objectionable in court. They have been used on various occasions.

Once when a man flourishing a revolver in court reinforcements were hurried up by the spiral stairway and the man brought down the same way. On other occasions disturbers who chained themselves to the gallery have been brought down quietly by the secret way.

KILLARNEY, Ireland, (AP)—An American heiress with a large income and a few million dollars for the restoration of the mansion on the estate of Earl of Kenmare would be highly appreciated by the entire population of the village of Killarney.

The Kenmare mansion was destroyed by fire many years ago and the village sighs for the return of the days when the dwelling ranked as one of the most magnificent in the British Isles.

Killarney has had lean years since the opening of the great war but now tourists, the source of the chief income of the village of 5000 which is better known abroad, perhaps, than any other scenic spot in Ireland, are beginning to come again.
