

## HATCHERY RUN TO BEGIN SOON

Salmon Eggs Taken at Troy and Innaha to Be Brought to Enterprise.

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special).—The taking of salmon eggs for the Enterprise hatchery from the Grande Ronde and Innaha rivers is now well under way, states a local newspaper. D. A. Clanton, superintendent of the hatchery, went to Troy on Tuesday to install troughs in which the eggs will be "eyed" before they are brought to Enterprise. The eggs cannot be moved safely when first taken from the salmon, but after they have developed until the growing organs can be seen like an eye floating in the semi-transparent globe, they can be shipped long distances.

Thus a miniature hatchery is being established on the Grande Ronde river. As fast as the eggs are taken from the salmon they will be put in these troughs, through which water is running all the time. The eggs will be kept until this fall when they are all "eyed." Then they will be packed in ice and removed to the hatchery at Enterprise. Charles Skaggs of Troy will help Mr. Clanton and will also look after the work in the latter's absence.

Two egg taking stations were established in the county this spring. One on the Innaha river above the bridge and the other at Troy on the Grande Ronde river. At these stations the salmon are stopped by screens so constructed that the smaller fish easily pass thru but the large salmon are held behind. As soon as the fish are ready to spawn they will be netted out and the eggs removed. This will not come for two or three weeks. Already a large number of salmon are held in the pool below the screen.

The present run of salmon from which eggs are to be taken is of the Chinook species. This fall the sockeye will be running up the streams of the county and eggs will be taken from them for propagation purposes. Mr. Clanton wishes to take enough eggs from the county streams to run the hatchery at full capacity, thus doing away with the necessity of having eggs shipped in from other places.

More yank eggs will be taken from the lake this fall. Last fall a large number of these eggs were taken and hatched at the hatchery. Half of the young fry were transferred to the feeding ponds at the head of the lake. They will be put back in the lake as soon as they are large enough to hunt food for themselves. The other half of the hatch have been held at the hatchery and will be turned loose to work their way to the ocean. Hatchery men believe that these yank are a species of land-locked sockeye salmon and think that if permitted to reach the ocean they

will reach the growth of a sockeye salmon.

This is a slack season at the hatchery with no work going on except the feeding of the fish in the rearing ponds. Taking advantage of the dull season men have been at work whitewashing the inside of the main hatchery building.

About seven million salmon are now held in the rearing ponds at the hatchery. There is a band of some three million sockeye and a larger herd of chinook yearlings. These yearlings will be marked and released this fall while the other fish will remain in the ponds until spring when they will be turned loose.

TILLAMOOK, Ore. — Funeral services for James E. Barger were conducted in the Henkle chapel by the Rev. Mr. Anderson. Later Barger married Rebecca Haefflin, mother of Mrs. John Keldson and Frank Cardiff. Last October Mrs. Barger died in Tillamook, and for the last year Barger lived alone here with Cardiff or visiting relatives in the Willamette valley.

Gaelic Signs Perplex Even Irish Visitors to Homeland

CORK, Ireland (AP).—Irish Americans returning to their native land after long absence are much at a loss in figuring out the street names in many towns of the Free State. Errors are being made generally throughout the state to popularize the Gaelic language, and in many cities and towns the street signs are printed in Gaelic.

Bookshops display Gaelic grammars and methods for learning the language, and advertise the exercise books employed in schools which are seeking to make the knowledge of Gaelic general throughout the island.

The struggle is much the same that many of the new states of Europe are making to put their own language above other tongues.

## FIND MADE IN GREEK TOMB

STOCKHOLM, (AP).—The discovery of 250 gold ornaments that were ancient heirlooms even in the time of Homer, the opening of a Greek tomb that had not been disturbed for more than 2,000 years, and the discovery that the so-called middle roof was not unknown in the architecture of that early day, are some of the important results just reported here, of the Swedish Archaeological Expedition, headed by Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf, which is excavating the ancient city of Assos, Greece.

The latest discovery of the Swedish experts came somewhat as a surprise when, after having explored a tomb as big as a house and finding nothing of unusual interest, they turned to a tomb less than five feet wide. This proved to be a treasure trove, dating about 1150 B. C., in the Mycenaean, or pre-Hellenic period.

It contained numerous earthenware vessels of rare design and decoration, eight beautiful bronze urns and other vessels, of which one was 20 inches high. One of the smaller bronze urns contained four necklaces of gold and iridescent glass beads, and curiously enough the strings were sufficiently well preserved to show the arrangement of the beads, so that the necklaces can now be restored to their exact appearance 2,000 years ago. The necklaces contained 650 beads and other ornaments, of which 250 were of gold.

The great tomb nearby, which contained few treasures, is nevertheless of great archaeological value, since it is built in the form of a house, and its top, hewn into the rock, is the exact shape of the familiar "middle roof," with sloping sides and gables at both ends. Thus proving that this architectural detail was known in Greece more than 1,000 years B. C.

The Swedish Expedition has been at work in the excavation of Assos for more than two years and has already unearthed and classified more than 500,000 treasures and fragments of value, some of which date back as far as 2,500 B. C. Yet the experts say that the work has only just begun, and that still more important discoveries may be expected in the near future.

All the portable finds of the Crown Prince's expedition are being studied in the University of Lund, Sweden, to which they have been shipped by special permission of the Greek government. As soon as the examination has been completed by archaeological experts the finds will be returned to Greece.

SURVEYOR GENERAL INSPECTS HIGHWAY

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## Indian Consecrate Two To Keep Tribal History

Five State Pleased Because Washington Accepts Envoy

WASHINGTON, (AP).—The controversy arising out of the question of withdrawing two Indian children from school in the Taos Pueblo, New Mexico, for the purpose of teaching them the pagan rites and traditional customs of the Pueblo Indians has been branded a "tempest in a teapot," by Commissioner Burke of the Indian Bureau.

Declaring the position of the Indian bureau had been misrepresented, Commissioner Burke expressed a belief that the question would be amicably settled before the new fall school term at the Taos Pueblo begins.

According to new information Mr. Burke has received, two Indian children between the ages of seven and ten are usually withdrawn for an 18-months period from modern educational instruction, to be taught the ancient rites and traditions of the tribe.

As there is no written history of the Pueblo the purpose is to develop the children to become priests and medicine men, and enable them to pass on to succeeding generations by word of mouth the story of Pueblo life.

The instructions given the children, Mr. Burke said, deal not only with religious matters but also the history and material means of the Pueblo from the beginning of time, including the uses of herbs and their medicinal qualities. The boys are supposed to be consecrated, are not permitted to play with other children and sleep under guard of an older Indian in the "estufa" or "hiva," a chamber built in or beneath the pueblo where secret religious ceremonies and tribal councils are held, and which is entered by a hole in the roof.

During their year and a half training, Mr. Burke continued, the boys are fed upon corn and corn products, squashes and other traditional vegetables. Meat from domestic animals is forbidden, such diet being confined to the flesh of wild animals, fish and wild birds.

Commissioner Burke denied that the bureau of Indian affairs had issued orders placing a ban on the holding by the Pueblos of their ancient religious ceremonies, and stated the government would not interfere in any way with them.

The Taos Pueblo is located 75 miles north of Santa Fe, on a small stream, and has a population of 618 Indians, the number increasing about 25 percent in the last twenty years.

Five State Pleased Because Washington Accepts Envoy

DUBLIN, (AP).—The official notification of Washington's acceptance of an Irish minister empowered to deal with questions between the Free State and the United States has given much satisfaction in Ireland, where it is regarded as "tangible proof of the United States' recognition of Ireland's new status."

"Washington," says the Freeman's Journal, "is not frightened by the specter which a certain section of the English press is busy conjuring up. Free State ambassadors have no intention of playing the part of a bull in a china shop as English die-hard profess to believe. They can be trusted to handle their business on business-like lines, keeping always well in mind that American friendship is not the least valuable of Irish assets."
