**FIRPO AND WILLS TO FIGHT IN NEW YORK SEPT. 11TH**

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—It is definitely settled that Firpo and Wills, heavyweights, will meet on the night of September 11 in Boyle's Thirty Acres at Jersey City.

NEW YORK (AP)—Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine heavyweight, and Harry Wills, his negro opponent, will meet in their 12-round match at Boyle's Thirty Acres in Jersey City on Thursday night, September 11, in an announced match made today by Tex Rickard, promoter of the match.

The date was finally selected after a prolonged conference with officials of the United States Polo association who had requested Rickard not to interfere with the international polo matches scheduled on September 8 and 10 and a possible third game on September 11. Rickard asked the Polo association to invite the Prince of Wales, who will be in this country for the polo matches, to attend the heavyweight fight.

Tickets for the fight will sell for prices ranging from \$2 to \$25 for ringside seats, plus the usual war tax.

Firpo has virtually decided upon Saratoga as a training ground.

**Wheat Crops Good**

HARRISBURG, Ore.—The dry season has made no material impression on the wheat crops of two local farmers, according to their report. Peter Vilk says he harvested 20 bushels of spring wheat to the acre. Paul Jensen just finished caring for a wheat crop that netted him 25 bushels an acre. The Jensen crop was grown on soil that was last year planted to corn.

## VON ELM WINS GOLF TOURNEY

LOS ANGELES (By the Associated Press)—George Von Elm, former trans-Mississippi amateur golf champion, defeated Jack Tarrant, former Texas player, 5 and 4 in the final match of the Rancho Country club sectional golf tournament here Sunday. Von Elm was never headed by his opponent and was five up at the turn. He went out in 35, one under par for the 14 holes.

**JOHNSTON SHOWS MARVELOUS GOLF**

CHICAGO (AP)—Harrison H. Johnston of St. Paul, winner of the western golf championship at Hinsdale Saturday, Sunday said that he expected to take part in the national championship at Philadelphia and might try for the western open title at Calumet club, Chicago, in September. Golf enthusiasts Sunday were still marveling at the golf displayed by Johnston in defeating Albert Secker in the finals. Saturday when he came from behind, and being four down and only five holes to play, won all five with 16 strokes. Johnston shot three of those five holes in one under par, and had a nine-foot putt for a sixth two on for an eagle three on the 56th yard seventeenth.

The marvel of the 45 holes, ever, was his 26-foot putt on the last hole over an undulating side hill green, for it was his putter that had played him false most of the day. He had missed a dozen chances to get down putts of six to eight feet and had holed only one long one of 20 feet on the eighth hole. This phase had made the match difficult, as Secker on a dozen holes when apparently beaten by straighter driving and closer approaching, equipped with dead or mung a long putt for a half or a win.

Johnston's victory takes the title away from Chicago for one of the few times in the 25 years it has existed. Chick Evans of Chicago having held it for the last four years straight besides four other times. He lost his title in the third round this year when defeated by James Maston of St. Louis.
