Branting Gives Keynote For Swede Socialists

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Socialization by evolution instead of revolution, peace by preparing for peace instead of war, the gradual elimination of militarism, the opposition to private uncontrolled capitalism, a secure home for every citizen, and a strip of Swedish soil for every Swede who wants it, these are the outstanding points of the keynote address delivered here by Hjalmar Branting at the Swedish Social Democrat party congress. This address holds a special significance as clearly defining the Social-Democrat platform in the elections this fall that may give Sweden its third socialist government.

"We have faith in labor's historical function in the reform of society," said Mr. Branting, "and we have begun to see the light dawning through the darkness. We realize that it was a mistake to think that political supremacy would be sufficient, and we know now that our ideals must grow into integral elements of society itself. We must, above all, mobilize and utilize the great moral forces among the laboring classes."

The ex-premier's speech was received with a demonstration of applause by the assembly of delegates from all districts of Sweden and was likewise strongly endorsed by the visiting delegates from Norway, Denmark, Finland, England, Belgium, and Poland.

Gold Production in U. S. Shows Continued Decrease

NEW YORK (AP)—Canada by 1924 will displace the United States as second among the gold producing countries of the world, in the opinion of Louis D. Huntton, New York mining engineer and a former professor of mining and metallurgy at Yale University. Canada is now third, Africa ranking first.

Mr. Huntton, after a prolonged study of the Dominion's gold districts, reports his conclusions in the official journal of the American Engineers. Canada's output of gold is increasing rapidly, he says, while in the United States since 1915 there has been a rapid decline.

Planes Destroy Harvest Outfit.
WALLA WALLA, Wash.—A combine harvester and standing grain of 75 acres on the Ben Grote place near Ellwood, were destroyed by fire. Mr. Grote says that the wheat was running about 15 bushels an acre. The timely arrival of 60 men from neighboring crews and ranches enabled the owner to extinguish the flames quickly. The fire started in the combine. Later a small explosion started a fire that destroyed the stationary threshing outfit on the Jerry Hee-chinor farm, seven miles north of here. A workman on top of the machine was hurled to the ground and slightly injured. Portions of a thousand sacks of wheat were burned, but it is thought that the grain in the interior of the sacks is not damaged. The loss is between \$2000 and \$3000.

Montana Crop Pans Spread.
HARLEM, Mont.—A delegation of growers and potato experts from Louisiana, interested in the Milk River valley as a possible source of supply for seed potatoes, will visit growers in the near future.

The experiments carried on at the Louisiana experiment station during the last two years with potatoes from the Milk River valley have shown up so favorably a profitable market there that will take a big acreage to supply.

Milk River valley growers are specializing in growing a certified potato that is free from all disease. Though the acreage is very good and prospects are encouraging for a good price this fall.
