Malaria Ravages Siberia.

KRASNOYARSK, Siberia (AP)—More than 3,000 persons have been stricken with malaria which has been spreading alarmingly throughout Siberia, especially in the Yenisei district. Emergency medical stations have been established in the worst affected areas, but the presence of large bodies of stagnant water and marshes has made the relief work difficult.

1010 DATE OF
NORSE VISIT

SPokane, Wash. (By the Associated Press)—That a party of Norse explorers crossed the American continent and settled in the Pacific northwest in 1010 A.D. is stated in a series of articles, publication of which was started by the Spokane Chronicle, detailing discoveries declared to have been made by Oleuf Lauritzen, Opjeon, a Norwegian scientist, who is visiting here.

Mr. Opjeon declares that he has discovered hundreds of carved stone tablets in various parts of the northern United States consisting of Norse letters peculiar to the Nordic settlements and other Norse characters that disprove an early belief that they were made by the Indians. By signs of the Zodiac and other astronomical figures, the year and in some cases the month and the day are shown, he said. These indicate, according to Mr. Opjeon's deductions, that a party of Norsemen, under a leader named Lippin settled first on both sides of Puget Sound in 1010, and after battles with Indians in which the superior weapons of the invaders usually rendered them victorious, they went to the Rogue river valley of Oregon.

Rome 200 years later, in 1262, a second expedition under a man named Nicolayson came to the Pacific northwest, he says, and tells of a stone sign he discovered in the state of Washington bearing that information.

Milk Demonstration
Is Attracting Many

An Oregon produced condensed milk prepared by the nationally famous Nestle Food company is being introduced to the housewives of this city by Miss Elsie L. Seely who is at present demonstrating the merits of the product at the Hooverized grocery.

FAIR MAY BE
STAGED AGAIN

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—A considerable number of interested persons met here recently to consider what plans were to be developed and arrangements made for holding the community fair here again this fall. While a fair representation of the town and community was present at the meeting, nothing definite was decided regarding the steps to be taken.

Next Monday night has been set aside as the date for another meeting, when it is expected that the matter will be decided upon.

The fair has been conducted during the past two falls, and has been a success from every standpoint. The attendance has been remarkably good at all times, with practically all expressing themselves well satisfied.

The question of whether an effort should be made to prepare better for the rodeo sports at the fair grounds or whether this part of the program should be dropped, has received considerable discussion, with some favoring the latter plan. However, many express the opinion that should this part of the fair be done away with, that it would take away some of the most interesting phases of the fair. This question has been brought up because of the lack of necessary fences and other equipment.

The fair has been a success from a financial standpoint, as shown by the receipts and expenses for the two preceding years. The organization has at this time a balance of \$309.46 to its credit. The total expense of the fair last year was \$362.15, with the receipts amounting to \$489.45. A balance of \$182.16 was carried over from the 1922 fair. Officers of the organization are: C. W. Mumford, president; Bruce Cox, secretary; E. T. Campton, treasurer. Many of the members of the local grange are strongly in favor of having the fair continue.
