COUE FAD HAS NOW SUBSIDED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—The Coue movement passed over the country like a hurricane and then subsided. For a time the book stores sold editions of his works at the rate of fifty to fifty copies daily. Today there is only one store in Portland that carries editions of his books.

"What movement has replaced Coue?" Dr. Richard C. Ewer, instructor of psychology in the Portland summer session, was asked. "According to his views, no other movement, so far, has satisfied or caught the popular fancy as that inaugurated by M. Coue. "Successive waves of psychotherapy have passed, periodically over the country," said Dr. Ewer. "But these have generally been in connection with religion. The potency of the Coue method, which so far has been the most popular, used, although no more or less effective than the others, is that it is more intelligible to the public."

"In the half century that the school of psychotherapy has flourished at Nancy," Professor Ewer continued, "few books have been understood, the subjects expanded, simplified, his subject made it more scientific and less esoteric, which resulted in his new wave rising to fame."

Babson Discusses the Election and Business

of the tariff and the closing down of many of our industrial plants in order to raise funds. In the central west, however, neither the republican or democratic parties can talk gloom because there is enough gloom here already. "Heretofore," says Mr. Babson, "it has been thought advisable by the democrats to have had business on election day when the republicans are in power, and it has been thought advisable by the republicans to have had business on election day when the democrats have been in power. Their bread lines would hurt the democrats as much as the republicans. When a bank is closed in the central west votes are made for La Follette. Every cent that the price of wheat drops between now and election day may easily give La Follette 100,000 votes, and every cent that the price of wheat goes up between now and election may result in giving the republicans and democrats 50,000 more votes each.

La Follette Dangerous

"Although the leaders of both parties tend to belittle La Follette and refer to his age and physical infirmities, yet it must be remembered that he is a very astute politician. This is shown by the fact that his ticket is being made up equally of democrats and republicans. Moreover, La Follette is shown, in being radical without getting tired up with socialists and ultra radicals whom he knows swing very few votes when business is good. He also knows that when the farmers are property owners they must naturally be conservative and are radicals only when the business conditions are temporarily against them. If wheat were \$2 a bushel today we would probably have no third party in the field, and yet La Follette was president today the price of wheat would not be one cent more than it is now. Such is the reality and hypocrisy of politics. Presidents do not make business conditions, but business conditions make presidents. Therefore, I repeat that heretofore it has been to the advantage of one of the two great parties to have more business on election day than this year conditions are entirely different. Whether or not the republican and democratic managers will be able to make better business between now and election I don't know, but they certainly are going to try to do so throughout the central west at least. The best barometer of La Follette's strength will be the actions of the businessmen which reflect a general business activity. It now stands at 12 per cent below normal compared with 10 per cent below normal a year ago."

DEAF MUTE IS INJURED

COVALLIS, Ore.—E. M. Strong of Salem, a deaf mute, was knocked unconscious from his motorcycle north of Covallis and remained unconscious for three hours. He collided with a car driven by Mrs. John Carnegie. No one knew he was deaf and dumb, so no warning after he had regained consciousness it was feared that the accident had affected his brain to render him speechless. He was badly lacerated and cut, but physicians could find no fractures and took for his early recovery.

SPAN RIDS TO BE CALLED

ROSEBURGH, Ore.—The county court announced that bids would be called for at once on the construction of the Mill creek bridge which, when completed, will permit the opening of the Roseburg-Scottsburg section of the Vanuys highway. SCHOOL HOUSE IS PORTABLE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—School children at the big logging camp near Bend expect rapid changes and think nothing of seeing their school house, containing desks, books, stove and everything but the teacher and themselves, hoisted twenty feet into the air by a huge crane and settled on a railway flat-car, to be moved with the rest of the camp to fresh timber, according to Miss Althea Stoneman, Bend school nurse, who is taking courses in the Portland summer session of the University.

Moves are made on Saturdays or Sundays so that students need miss no working days. The schools are surprisingly well equipped and have trained teachers and high standards, says Miss Stoneman. Under her inspection are approximately 100 children in logging camps, divided into five schools. Water is often scarce and frequent quarts have to be hauled, but the little people are clean and tidy as possible and respond readily to tooth-brushing and throat gargling. Many of them were born in the woods and know mainly the peaceful life they lead beneath the great Deschutes white pine trees.
