### COAST TENNIS STAR VICTOR

Howard Kinsey Defeated William M. Johnston in Seabright Tournament.

SEABRIGHT, N. J. (AP)—William M. Johnston, America's second ranking tennis star, went down to a sensational defeat at the hands of Howard Kinsey, Pacific coast champion, here Friday in the final of the Seabright Invitational tennis tournament. Kinsey triumphed after the best of five sets, 6-4, 3-6, 4-2, 1-6, 6-3, flashing perhaps the most brilliant tennis in his career.

There was a veritable and effective of Kinsey's attack that astonished. He had an assortment of strokes that few had thought him capable and he controlled them beautifully. Time and again he forced Johnston out of position, compelling errors when he was not driving the ball for placement. Johnston was the Johnson of old only on infrequent occasions. Every now and then his forehead or crashed through at will with all his former power and sting, but on the whole he failed to inject enough severity in his shots to compel Kinsey to take the defensive. This lack of speed, coupled with frequent lapses in control, cost Johnston the match.

**Johnson Fights Hard**  
The veteran player fought determinedly from first to last and thrived with some sparkling spurs but he failed to sustain his attack.

At one stage in the final set he appeared headed for victory. He was in the lead at 3-1 and going strong when Kinsey struck a brilliant streak and ran five games in a row for the set and match.

Service, which was broken through often by moth players, was a minor factor. The comparative point score was 143 to 124, with the figures practically even up to the last three games.

Miss Mary Browne scored the

first California victory earlier in the day when she overcame Miss Maxine Macdonald, national clay court champion, in the women's singles final. The score was 6-0, 6-1, and it was just as decisive as the figures indicate. Miss Macdonald's chop drive was entirely too soft to prevail against the severity of Miss Browne's drive and her volleying and smashing at the net.

Later in the day, Miss Browne scored another triumph, this time with the aid of Mrs. T. Horace Duxley of Los Angeles. They proved entirely too formidable a doubles combination for Miss Maxine Macdonald and Miss Florence Ballin in the women's final, particularly in the forward court, and scored a quick victory at 6-2, 6-1.

**AUSTRALIA AGAIN**

**WINS FROM CHINA**

NEW YORK (AP)—Australia won the third and deciding point tennis match in the Davis cup tennis matches on the turf of the Crescent Athletic club in Brooklyn Friday. Gerald P. Patterson and Pat O'Hara, the international veterans, clinched the first battle of the American zone series in this country by defeating 1-1, 6-3, 6-2, 6-0, 6-0. The Chinese stars, in the doubles, the score was 6-1, 6-2, 6-0. The respective point totals were 55 and 34.

### PADDOCK WINS IN STOCKHOLM

STOCKHOLM, Sweden. (AP)—The American team of Olympic athletes added further victories to its score in the second day of the stadium games in which picked teams from Holland, Switzerland and Sweden are participating. "Hare" Paddock, the Los Angeles athlete with runner, won the 200-meter race in 21 9/10 seconds with Loren Murchison of Newark, second, 22 3/5 seconds.

The 400-meter hurdle race was won by Ivan Reilly, Illinois athlete club, his time being 54 2/5 seconds. Allan Helfrich, Penn State college, won the 400-meter flat, in 1:35 2/5. Paulen, Holland, was second, 1:56 7/10, and Martin, Switzerland, third, 1:56 2/5.

The shot put was won by Sweden, Jansson registering 14.41 meters. Emerson Norton, Georgetown university, was second with a throw of 13.10 meters. Sweden won the 1600-meter relay race in 3 minutes, 19 seconds. The United States was second with 3 minutes, 24 2/5 seconds.

## CHANGES FOR GAMES URGED

Curtailed Olympic Contests Similar to Ancient Ones Is Program Proposed.

STOCKHOLM (AP)—A radical change in the programs of Olympic games to a pattern more resembling that of the original Olympics in ancient Greece, involving a reduction of the number of contests to 25, is urged by Erik Bergvall, director of the Olympic stadium in Stockholm, and a well-known leader in Swedish athletics.

Mr. Bergvall, although personally in opposition to the power of the Olympic games to strengthen the feeling of solidarity among nations, as the Olympics in ancient Greece helped to bind together the states, but he points out that it is becoming increasingly difficult for smaller nations to participate on the large scale which the modern games demand.

The ancient games lasted only five days and there were only 15 or 16 events on the program, while the modern games last for months and have had all the way from 163 to 250 events.

The Swedish expert grants that climate and other physical circumstances make it necessary for various nations to develop sports more or less peculiar to themselves, and in which they would naturally be expected to win the highest prizes, hence it would not be fair to cut the program down to the ancient limits. Yet, allowing for this variety, he thinks the number of events could be reduced to 25.

The ideal program, according to Mr. Bergvall, is as follows: Running, 100, 400, 1,500 and 5,000 meter races; hurdles one event; high jump, broad jump, pole vault, javelin, discus, shot, hammer, pentathlon, decathlon, wrestling, in five classes, gymnastic drill, swimming, 100, 200, 500.
