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Bordered Silk



HERE is an excellent example of how effectively bordered silk may be used. The printed design in black on the white gown affords all the trimming necessary, save the straps that break the plainness of the front. One of the newest and charming combinations of fur and feathers recently seen consists of a round little hat of dove colored velvet entirely covered by a fringe of small ostrich feathers falling from an upright tuft on top. This fringe is also used to cover entirely a collar of badger, the ends of which blend beautifully with the feather and velvet of the hat.

New Scarf Effect. Paris—There is a new way today of wearing the scarf. It is folded, shawl-like, and then the end folded under again, after which it is tucked into the neck in front. The result is a Marie Antoinette touch.

Tulip Gloves. Paris—The little tulip gloves are immensely popular at present. Worn with very short sleeves, they are often in black kid with gauntlets of white in tulip petal effect.

Hints for the Housewife

PIQUANT DELICACIES

We have so many fruits that we are apt to neglect and disregard that English favorite, the gooseberry. We use gooseberries mostly in their green state for sauce or in pies. They are good in that way, though very acid, but the berries should always be cooked before putting in pies or puddings. Enamelled ware which is imperative to fruit acids will not change the color of the fruit and is therefore desirable for these uses.

For green gooseberry sauce, cook the gooseberries in an enameled ware saucepan until soft, and then add sugar cup for cup. When ripe the gooseberry makes a very nice jam mixed with raspberries. Put the berries into an enameled ware preserving kettle and crush with a long enameled ware spoon. Add sugar, one cup of sugar to one and one-half of fruit. Cook slowly, stirring often, with the cover off the kettle. Cook until the juice is cooked away and the berries are a smooth jam.

tory at this stage of the campaign, a lot of new cash will be needed to carry the fight to victory on November 4.

More than 750,000 names are on his lists, covering "dependable" workers in every state, county, ward and precinct, who may be called upon to shoulder local duties and responsibilities.

"Economy," however, is to be maintained as the Democratic watchword. Being out of debt is to justify any reckless spending. But those at the party helm say it does bring a certain sense of security and confidence, that is difficult to achieve when every other caller identifies himself as a bill collector.

As an example of the economy, or at least of "skilful" management, practiced by Hull as chairman, it is pointed out that while the San Francisco convention of 1920, lasting seven days, cost the party's national treasury \$25,000, the 14-day struggle at New York was handled by Hull at a net cost of but \$50,000.

LAUDS PACIFIC NORTHWEST

BOISE, Ida.—There is no reason why the 250,000 square miles known as the Pacific northwest should not be one of the most wonderful sections that the world has ever known, or ever will," said Enoch A. Bryan, former Idaho commissioner of education, in an address before a session of the summer normal school in the high school auditorium.

The history of this territory, of which Idaho is an important factor, is included in the history of the commonwealth and shows the section to be unique in resources, extent, geological advancement and educational progress.

"Among the most important of Idaho's resources is the vast amount of water power which is available in this state," continued the speaker. "Because of the gigantic flow of the Snake river and its tributaries and the rapid decrease in elevation to be found throughout the state, Idaho has one-half all the water power in the United States."

"The glorious thing about Idaho's natural and potential resources is the fact that they may be renewed by reproduction."

DEFENSE DAY IS EXPLAINED

LINCOLN, Neb. (By the Associated Press).—Defense Day plans do not call for any disruption of business. President Coolidge told Governor Bryan in replying to a request from the governor for advice as to the scope of the war department's plans.

"Plans for the patriotic demonstration are dependent on the state and local desires and are intended to be purely voluntary," the president told Bryan who recently voiced opposition to calling civilians from their work to take part in demonstrations.

LEGION FAVORS PLAN

INDIANAPOLIS (By the Associated Press).—The American Legion posts throughout the country are in favor of the success of national defense day, September 12, according to a statement sent to all units of the organization by General W. Powell, director of national Americanization committees of the legion.

The defense test should be used he said as part of the legion's program in obtaining passage of the universal draft bill sponsored by the organization under the terms of which men, money and material would be drafted in case of war. Mr. Powell urged all legionnaires to bend every effort to make the tests an outstanding accomplishment in the history of the nation.

(AP).—Governor Blaine today recorded himself as definitely opposed to national defense day and characterized the plan as designed to stimulate the national military movement which would be taken by federation countries as a militaristic national government will participate only on the call of the president, the statements said.

IDAHO HAS \$3,775,871 CASH. BOISE, Idaho.—Cash in the Idaho treasury at the close of business July 7 amounted to \$3,775,871. E. E. Hyatt, director of public accounts, reported after completing an examination of the state treasurer's office. The report shows that \$3,093,955 is deposited in banks and that more than \$2,400,000 of this amount is in Idaho banks. The remainder of some \$676,000 is in a New York bank. Investments and "cash items" totaling more than \$650,000 make up the grand total cash of \$3,775,871.
