TO SURVEY PUBLIC LANDS

WASHINGTON.—Appropriation of the \$700,000 appropriated for survey of public lands during the present fiscal year, was announced by the interior department as follows:
Alaska, \$40,000; Arizona, \$45,000; California, \$10,000; Colorado, \$45,000; Idaho, \$40,000; Montana, \$45,000; Nebraska and South Dakota, \$15,000; Nevada, \$35,000; New Mexico, \$45,000; Oregon, \$45,000; Utah, \$45,000; Washington, \$25,000; Wyoming, \$25,000; eastern district, \$45,000. Administrative expenses will total \$122,000.

The foreign service as a secretary at Tokyo in 1907, is doing the heavy diplomatic stuff for Hughes.

Mrs. Amos Fries, wife of the chief of the chemical warfare service of the U. S. army, and Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook, president general of the D. A. H., fear that radical propaganda has turned the heads of American women and has caused their sympathies to run away with their good sense.

"Pacifist groups in America," they say, "have wasted a great deal of their sentimental appeal to our women, and our women's organizations."

In an appeal to "all right thinking peoples," they seek to set the women of this country on guard against "any individual or group of individuals who would substitute untried theories for our great institutions of government."

Although not so labeled, the Fries-Cook warning might be interpreted as an appeal to the women to look the other way when the La Grange-Whoecker campaigners come to town.

In addition to her warning to women to beware the "legions" of the pacifist and radical, Mrs. Fries has advanced her pathos, entitled "I Didn't Raise My Boy to Be a Shacker," which is being distributed through the Reserve Officers' Association.

SAWS BUSY AT PLANT AGAIN

Brief Shut-Down of Enterprise Concern Employed to Clean Out Log Pond.

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special)—The East Oregon sawmill resumed work the first of the week, after a local newspaper, after a brief shut-down for the purpose of cleaning the log pond. The idle period was a short vacation for the men who were not put at other tasks and did not affect the planing mill or other parts of the plant.

Only part of the pond was cleaned during the shut-down, around the south and southwest sides, where the logs are unloaded and are worked up into the mill. A boom will hold logs in this area while the remainder of the pond can be cleaned while the mill is running. A large steel bucket dragged back and forth across the pond by wire cables operated by a steam engine is used to scrape up and carry out the sediment of water-soaked wood and of earth which has been deposited over the bottom.

A large addition to the dry storage shed which is part of the planing mill, is under construction. This is at the east end of the planer. It is of heavy construction and is built to permit lumber to be stacked on end instead of laid flat.

The new method is said to have advantages in ease of piling, as no lumber has to be piled high to the top of a pile. A few months ago an extension was built to the west end of the planer storage shed, so its capacity soon will be double what it was a year ago.

Railroad construction continues in the woods, for adequate logging areas must be opened up ahead of actual logging, regardless of price or profits. New logging contracts are being made. Last winter was unusually favorable for logging operations, with mild weather and little snow. Hence the contractors finished their cuts earlier than had been expected and found their work very profitable. When they finished and decked their logs there was a lull in activity in the woods.

The East Oregon management is operating and spending large sums of money in the face of a lumber market which is decidedly discouraging. Present shipments are heavy, but prices are less than actual cost for a large part of the output. In fact some of the staple grades are selling for a third less than cost.
