Cane Fruit Industry Sound

Increasing demand for canned goods and other horticultural products give ground for belief that the Oregon cane fruit industry will continue to hold its own and undergo some slight expansion. Future plantings should be limited by present and prospective market conditions, says Henry Hartman of the experiment station, as potential production is far in excess of present market requirements. Western growers will profit by recognizing that producers are largely servants of consumers and must produce only to the extent consumers can be induced to buy. Vigorous demand for any cane fruit does not mean that the demand is unlimited and justifies unlimited plantings.

EXPERT CRIME CASE WITNESS

Dr. William Healy, Alienist, Asserts Young Leopold and Loeb Have No Souls.

(CHICAGO) (By the Associated Press)—Another expert witness for the defense took the stand Monday in the hearing before Judge John H. Caverly to determine the punishment for Nathan F. Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, kidnapers-murderers of Robert Franklin and stripped from them any vestige of soul, as interpreted, or consideration of society, left by the first psychiatrist who testified Saturday.
"Leopold told me he could contemplate committing a murder with no more conscience than was necessary in selecting the sort of pie for dinner," said the witness, Dr. William Healy of Boston, Mass.
"Loeb told me they had considered kidnapping and slaying members of his own family, and that he would delight in killing for instance Walter Dierbach of his counsel if he thought he would gain anything by it in the matter of publicity or pleasure of anticipation or examination of the plan."
"Leopold told me that he revealed in the fact that he had no ground for conscience," testified the mental pathologist. "He said that at an early age he began trying to kill affection, to break down any feeling for his family and began to develop his selfish, egotistic ideal."

SINNOT MAY SEEK CHAIR

According to a Washington Bureau dispatch Congressman Sinnott may run for house leader. The dispatch follows:
"Congressman N. J. Sinnott of Oregon is receiving mention among western members of the house as a possible candidate for the speakership in the next congress on whom western and progressive forces may unite. Speaker Gillett is a candidate for senator from Massachusetts, and whether successful or not, will retire from the house."

TIMBER PRICES ARE STRONGER

Expanding demand and strengthening prices form the basis of reports from practically all lumber producing territories, says the American Lumberman, Chicago.
Advised from southern pine manufacturing centers state that the call for that wood, which showed a big pick-up immediately following July 4, continues to broaden, and that bookings are approximately normal and considerably in excess of production. Common stocks, such as boards, dimension, center matched flooring and ceiling, are moving freely, but some industrial items, notably railroad and car material, are still low.

LOST MONEY IS DISCOVERED

POCATELLA, Idaho (Special).—With all the affirmations of a tale of buried treasure and with a flash that lights a dim past, filled with similar stories of lost mines in the early mining districts of the west, comes the reported location of the secret mine of the Florence basin, one of the best known of the diggings figuring in the Idaho placer excitement of 1890 to 1896. Florence was one of the richest placer grounds known to modern man and from its comparatively small area came in the neighborhood of \$45,000,000.

Following a clue given by an old prospector, who died at Helix Ore, about a year ago, two Idaho men, Tom Meyers of Weiser and Frank Liab of New Meadows, have located in Florence, they believe to be the long lost "other lode," from whence came all the richness taken from the sands by the old miners. The old prospector, William Piper who lived to be 100 years of age, died declaring himself the only man knowing the location of the greatest lode of central Idaho's mining lands.
