

# WALLOWA WILL ADD TO WATER

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—At a recent meeting of water users in the town a committee was appointed to work out plans which would help to meet the acute shortage at this time. Due to the extreme shortage of irrigation water, it was not possible to secure any water for irrigation of gardens and lawns here and it was decided after due consideration to go up Bear creek, a short distance above the intake, and dig a number of wells, to a depth of about ten feet. It is thought that in this manner an abundant supply of water can be obtained for city use. Many also feel that it will not greatly reduce the flow of the creek, because of the under flow, which will be tapped in this way, much of this water would no doubt otherwise run along underground channels. Many excellent gardens have been grown in town this season, and all regret very much the shortage of irrigation water, which if it lasts for any length of time will result in the gardens drying up badly.

T. G. Johnson and others returned home Tuesday evening from a two day trip into the mountains where they went in search of huckleberries. The berries were not found very plentiful, only a few gallons being secured. Farmers in all parts of the valley are well along with their haying, many jobs have been finished while others are in the midst of the stacking. Very little hay is being sold in this end of the valley yet, reports from farther up the valley state that a considerable amount of hay has been sold or contracted to stockmen at very satisfactory prices.

Frank Walker who was operated on at the hospital here last Saturday is said to be improving nicely at this time.

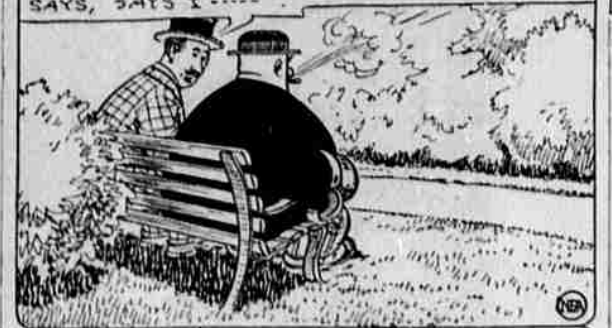
The wheat farmers of this section feel encouraged in the prospects for good prices on all lines of grain, while the crops are expected to be very light at threshing time over the entire country. Many feel that with the recent advance in prices, that they will fare at least as well as in former years, when the yield has been large and the prices low. From information available it appears that all are holding for a higher price, as no wheat has been contracted in this section of the country.

Logging operations in the woods are said to be much less at this time than earlier in the season. Only a small crew of men are being worked by the Bowman-Hicks Co. in their logging area near Maxville.

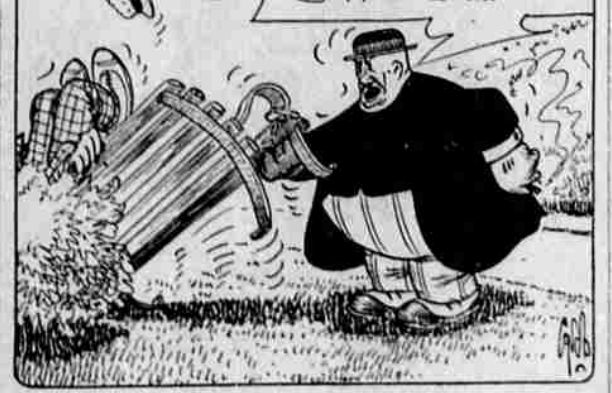

The iron (formerly golden) medal went to Frans von Mendelssohn, president of the German Chamber of Commerce, for recent support given to scientific and technical studies of various kinds.

**London Audience Goes Wild Over Old Stage Favorite.**  
LONDON (AP).—London critics are hailing with acclaim the return of Marie Tempest to musical comedy after an absence of 25 years in straight comedy roles. Her recent appearance in a comedy-fantasy occasioned an ovation on her every entry, and after the close of the last act Miss Tempest was kept on the stage for 13 minutes while the audience, English audiences are the most conservative in the world, expressed its appreciation by a gale of handclapping, cane pounding and shouting. So overcome was Miss Tempest at her reception that once, during the second act, she completely forgot her lines and was forced to improvise for several minutes. She confessed at the close of the evening, London critics said that the enthusiasm with which she was hailed was memorable. Miss Tempest, who is 58 years old, first appeared on the stage in "Hoccaido" in 1885.

## BOY QUESTION NOW SOLVED

MUKWONAGO, Wis. (AP).—The problem of what shall be done with the wayward boy has been solved in part in Wisconsin by D. W. Morris, Milwaukee philanthropist, who for several years has absorbed some of the output of the juvenile courts of Milwaukee and placed it on a 152 acre farm near here. At present there are 67 boys on the Morris farm, varying in age from eight to 18 years. Nearly 75 per cent of these came from "broken" homes, those where parents are divorced or separated or where a death occurred among parents. Not all of the boys are wayward or the product of the juvenile court, several being simply homeless lads. Mr. Morris and his mother personally direct the operation of the farm, although they reside in their home in Milwaukee. A corps of assistants handles the details. While all of the boys are given tasks that educate them in the care of purebred stock, in the raising of the crops and the marketing of farm products, including milk, butter, cheese, fruit and vegetables, the general tone of the place is to carry out the idea of a real home, getting away entirely from the idea of a correctional institution, which the term is not, in the sense of state supervision.
