## RETURNS GIVE KLUXERS LEAD

returns for the fall elections yesterday.

The polls closed late in all the states and indications were that the balloting had been heavy. Long ballots were expected to slow up the gathering and tabulating of returns.

Fair weather greeted the voters and the day passed off quietly despite the heat of the campaigns. The Ku Klux Klan issue bobbed up in all the states and to observers was regarded as the big factor in Oklahoma, where J. C. Walton, deposed governor and Klan foe, sought the democratic nomination for United States senator, against a strong field.

A few scattered returns from Kansas gave United States Senator Capper, republican, seeking re-nomination, a two to one lead over his two opponents.

A heavy vote was reported in St. Louis which political observers have predicted would be the pivotal factor in the Missouri primary. The gubernatorial race held the spotlight in Missouri with a heated contest in each party.

ST. LOUIS.—Returns from the first 12 precincts out of 3577 in Missouri for the republican governorship contest gave: Baker 619; Lloyd 148; Miller 154.

These were from country districts.

The first 20 precincts reporting on the democratic race for the gubernatorial nomination gave: Nelson 622; Jacobs 474; Moore 310; Priest 257; Loflin 34.

## LONDON LIKES OREGON APPLE

NEW YORK (Special)—American delegates to the recent advertising convention in London were surprised to find how extensively the English markets were supplied with fruit and other commodities from the Pacific coast. They felt quite at home when they saw California oranges and grapefruit on sale in the London shops, while even watermelons of fair size were obtainable.

Not only in London but even in the smallest towns Oregon apples were an sale, and were evidently in great demand. Dates, raisins, canned fruit, canned fish and other Pacific coast products were also found to be conspicuous features of the English grocery stores, a fact which the advertising men regarded as a tribute to American enterprise. These imports of American food commodities, they were told, would undoubtedly show an increase in coming years. Already the amount of foodstuffs shipped from the Pacific coast to England has become so large as to represent a considerable proportion of the cargo sent overseas.

Pacific coast shipments to Europe during the coming season, it is predicted, will surpass even last year's encouraging record, as larger cargoes of wheat and flour will be sent across the Atlantic because of the European crop shortage.
