John Clark, "Master of Women" Duped Many

Bradford Koyert, at one time connected with motion pictures under the name of Mary Savage. With her he drew up a curious contract, investigators say, by which the actress pledged herself to become the virtual slave of Clark for a year.

She was to defer to him in all matters of conduct, judgment, attention, social, mental and business activities. She was to see him practically every day. She surrendered her entire soul to Clark by the contract, beginning in May, 1922. In return for this abnegation she expected to win favorable reception and large income from motion pictures, through her mentor's powers.

Search of his correspondence after arrest revealed numerous other similar contracts with women. Like many of these Mary Savage broke the bond when she discovered that seeing Clark every day "took too much time and didn't get her anywhere."

Movie Fame a Lure.
Movies: A promise of fame in the movies, Marie word, Clark trafficked on it. Italian Oriental mystery and suspense. He was fast in promising trips to India—an overwhelming allure of romance to many who called him master, Hays, without too much modesty, that he knows women.

Jury," Mr. Crowe insisted. Doctor Healy, who had been on the stand, giving direct testimony, for five hours, retained his composure under a terrific two and a half hour cross-examination by Mr. Crowe, who tried to break down the value of the expert's conclusions that Frank's murder grew directly from the youth's "diseased motivation," "boyhood phantasies" and an "abundant childish compact," in which perversion was a tie.

Fear and caution, the instincts of self-preservation, governed the actions of the boys at times, both in planning the murder and in seeking to evade responsibility for it, were qualified admissions the prosecutor succeeded in forcing from the mental pathologist. The state's attorney went over the details of the youths' confessions, step by step, with each followed by the question, "What was working, then, intellect or emotion?" Thus he tried to show that the crime grew from the youth's admitted high intellect, rather than from their immature emotions.

Mr. Crowe also tried unsuccessfully to bring from the mental expert an admission that boys of the intellectual attainments of Loeb and Leopold could have deceived him as to their undeveloped emotions, if having been testified that they were below 7 years in emotional age.

The prosecutor, not satisfied with the judge's ruling on the insanity angle, hammered away at it throughout the cross-examination. Doctor Healy admitted that psychosis is a new medical term for insanity, and Mr. Crowe asked if psychosis, "insane" or "dumb," did not mean the same, but without obtaining a satisfactory reply.

Court Receives Letters.
Judge Caverly told newspaper men, after adjournment, that he would turn over to postal inspectors some of the 200 to 400 letters regarding the case that he receives daily.

"Anyone who writes a letter to the judge in a situation like this is attempting to influence the court's opinion, and is therefore in contempt of court," said the judge. "There are federal and state laws covering this point."

Judge Caverly declared many of the letters were threatening, many appealed for leniency for Leopold and Loeb, and others attempted to gild him by quoting from various state laws and from the scriptures.

The hearing promises to continue for at least a fortnight longer, in the opinion of Clarence S. Barrow, chief of defense, "and then I am making a conservative estimate," he said. The defense will use two or three more alibis, Mr. Barrow indicated, with an undetermined number of other witnesses, some of whom will probably be members of the families of the two defendants.

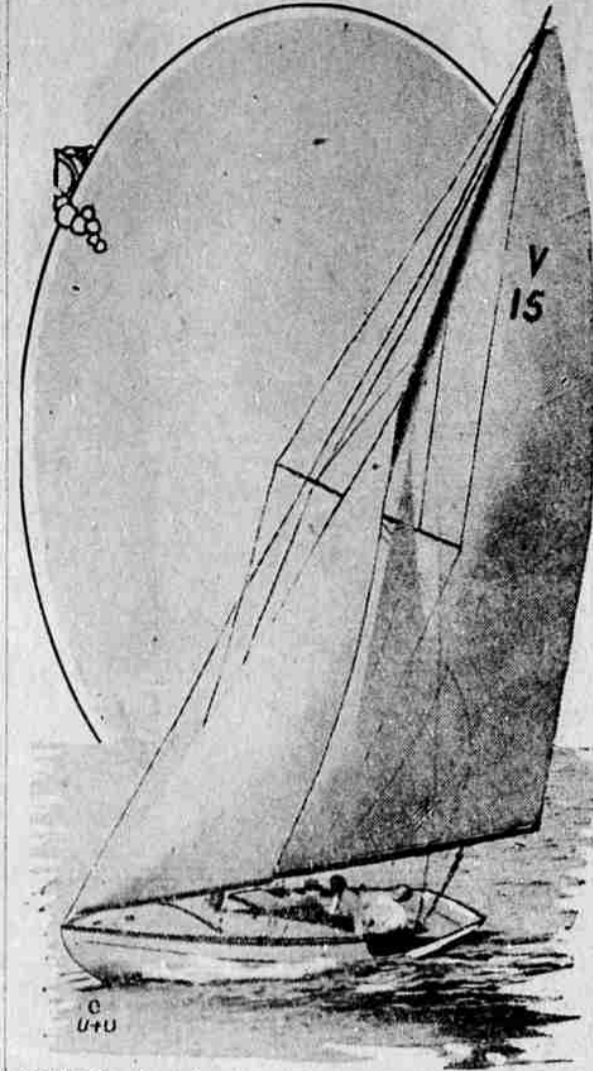

Mr. Heath declared, "The Philippines at one time set aside 1,000,000 pesos annually to be used in spreading propaganda over the United States to further the cause of political independence for the island possession. We have stopped this expenditure of public money, but the work is being carried out by popular subscription."

"That real line of cleavage in the part of the world is the difference between black and white. On the one hand we have millions of black, brown and yellow people, only a day removed from their own primitive way of living, thinking and doing. On the other hand we have the Anglo-Saxons with centuries of progress behind them, and a background of successful endeavor in all lines of work."

"The natives can initiate a plan of action in a few minutes, but the element of stability is missing in their character, and they can not be depended on to stay with a task consistently and carry it through to a successful conclusion. They have not the background of a people that would enable them to carry through, and they should not be declared a free and independent nation until they should the state of Oregon."

Mr. Heath also attacks the movement for independence being waged by the natives on the ground that the congress of the United States has no right to grant freedom to the island country. "We acquired possession of four territories as a result of the war with Spain, the Philippine Islands, Cuba, Porto Rico and Guam," he said. "In the case of Cuba we were to maintain a guardianship until

that country was able to handle its own affairs, but the case of the three other possessions were wholly different in that Spain ceded to the United States possession of them. The Philippine Islands are as much a part of this country as is Oregon, and congress on its own initiative has no right to grant the islands their independence."

The withdrawal of the fleet of Great Britain from eastern waters leaves that part of the world largely unprotected except for the part taken by the United States and Japan. Mr. Heath pointed out, and the withdrawal of this country would leave Japan in a position to enforce her desires as laws.

"The governor of the Dutch colonies visited Manila a few weeks before we sailed, and he informed me that the subjects of the Dutch government in those colonies number 22,000,000, or more people than are to be found in the kingdom of Japan. China is one mass of chaos without any semblance of government, and India is in the same category. The turmoil that probably would result from the withdrawal of the United States, even if it could be legally done as the islanders ask, can easily be imagined. It would be an invitation to more chaos, disorder, and probably war."
