Iowa Corn Fields Hurt By Excessive Rainfall

DES MOINES, Ia. (AP)—Thousands of acres of corn in the Missouri river lowlands have been overtaken by weeds and will be abandoned while few fields between the Des Moines and Missouri rivers will yield above 20 bushels per acre, according to the weekly weather and crop bulletin issued by state and federal observers here. The average production in the territory outlined probably will be less than 20 bushels and only an unusually favorable season can mature the crop, the report adds. The observers declare much of the acreage will produce only fodder.

Considering next inter-racial relations, Dr. Gregory suggested that in countries where white and colored races lived side by side, four policies might be followed: (1) amalgamation by inter-marriage; (2) co-residence with complete social separation; (3) disfranchisement of the colored population or (4) the segregation of the different races in separate countries in communities. The policy of co-residence with social separation is on its trial at the present day in the United States. 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Last Minute News

HEAT WAVE TAKES TOLL. PITTSBURG (AP).—Two deaths from the heat and many prostrations have occurred here this week.

WASHINGTON (AP).—Relief from the heat wave which has gripped the eastern sections of the country is promised by tonight or tomorrow. Washington yesterday experienced the hottest day since 1918. Twelve prostrations were reported.

NEW YORK (AP).—New York faced another scorching day with the temperature at 82 degrees at 10 o'clock this morning. Two deaths and more than a score prostrations occurred in the last 12 hours. Most of the city's millions left their tenements and thronged parks during the night.

WARNS OF "CALAMITY" NAHANT, Mass. (AP).—Senator Lodge, in an address dictated from his sick bed and made public here, warns Republicans against what he terms the "calamity" of Governor Charles W. WORK TO BE COMPLETED THIS FALL

Contract on La Grande Entrance to Be Let on Eve of August 20

LONE OBJECTION MADE ON DISTRICT

Paving to Be 52 Feet in Width; Property Owners to Pay for Forty-Four Feet.

One of the long felt needs of La Grande as a community is now certain of fulfillment. Last evening the city commission directed the city engineer to advertise for bids, to be received Wednesday evening, August 20, on improvement district No. 143, which is East Adams avenue from the present pavement to the city limits, where it will connect with the La Grande-Lone Tree hard surfaced highway.

Last night was the time set for the hearing of all remonstrances, objections and claims of grievances on the district, preliminary to ordering the calling of bids.

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It was understood that the defense desired to eliminate all lay witnesses provided the state would do likewise.
