tion, high prices and mediocre service, and the dozen and one annoyances and inconveniences that beset the existence of the average journeyer here, as the lot of a temporary dweller anywhere, and make the heat of it with a minimum of protest.

Among this group—and it is one of the largest in Washington—there is little loyalty to the capital city. It has taken from them in full measure for what it has given. It never becomes their city, their home.

They now know too well the rear sides of those false fronts which first fascinated them. They may "like" Washington, but their love remains steadfast with Kankakee, Kalamazoo and Walla Walla.

One of the difficulties with Washington, on the material side of its evolution, has been its intensive development. Washington is limited by the boundaries of the District of Columbia. It cannot expand, it cannot spread. It cannot sprout extensive suburban areas of comfortable homes and annex them as part of the parent city.

Anything outside the 7 1/2 square miles of the District of Columbia never can hope to be a part of Washington.

You may live two miles from the White House, in Virginia, but you are an outsider.

You may be five miles from the White House, and in Maryland, and you are likewise outside the pale.

But you may be seven miles from the White House, and still inside the remotest point of the District Line, and the rest of the United States will pay 40 per cent of your city taxes.

The result of these fixed limits to what may ever be included in the beneficiaries of the nation as its capital city has resulted in a close control, by a few large interests, of the undeveloped territory still within the District.

This assured monopoly has in turn made possible the capitalization of these lands on a scale which forces their sale in the smallest possible plots.

This makes for congestion and crowding and ugliness, not for a healthy, happy, "beautiful" capital city.

TO OPEN BANK AT WEISER, IDA.

BOISE, Ida. (Special)—Weiser will have a new banking institution, capitalized at \$40,000, it was announced Thursday by Crawford Moore, president of the First National bank of Idaho, Boise. This institution will be the only one of its kind in Weiser, the two banks formerly there having closed their doors. Application for a state charter will be made shortly.

The new bank will be owned and operated by C. C. Anderson, Eugene Looney, E. A. Van Sledright, Raymond Moore, Crawford Moore and J. W. Cunningham, stockholders of the First National bank. No name has been decided upon for the new bank, which will be a state institution, under supervision of the state department of finance.

E. W. Porter, commissioner of finance, announced Thursday that no attempt would be made to reorganize or reopen the Weiser Loan and Trust company bank which failed recently. It will be taken over by the state and its depositors paid as fast as its assets can be liquidated.

VERNONIA PLANS MADE.

VERNONIA, Ore.—The Vernonia chamber of commerce met to form plans for re-organization of the club and discuss employment of a paid secretary. It was pointed out by business men of the city that under the present system the secretary received no salary and no real progressive work could be expected of him. The club will be put on a business basis and an annual budget made up for carrying out work outlined for the year.

The road committee was instructed to work in conjunction with the Inland Highway Association, Inc., to further completion and paving of the road from Portland to Astoria, via the Nehalem valley.

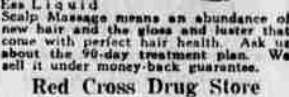
Vernonia Contract Awarded.

VERNONIA, Ore.—At the last meeting of the city council of Vernonia, the contracting firm of EK & Lind of Portland received the contract for the construction of the municipal sewer system which was authorized by the voters of this city last spring. Their bid was the lowest of the seven firms who bid on the construction of the system, and was for \$49,728.24 for concrete pipe, and for \$49,112.25 for vitrified pipe.

Passion Players Trip Divides Oberammergau

OBERRAMMERGAU, BAVARIA (AP)—Oberammergau is not the peaceful village that it was before Anton Lang and his wood carving companions went to America early this year. Local opponents of the trip to the United States have gained reinforcements since the return of the Lang party some weeks ago and the town has divided into bitter Lang and anti-Lang groups.

The anti-Lang forces assert that the American visit of the Oberammergau players was an attempt to commercialize the Passion Play, that the trip was a financial failure and they have threatened to sabotage the next production of the performance scheduled for 1932.

Anton Lang himself has held aloof from his critics thus far and refuses to answer them, contending that the charges are unfounded, and avers that the Passion Play will not suffer from criticism or jealousies of individuals.

WAY TO FIGHT PESTS GIVEN

Grasshoppers may be successfully poisoned where damage is sufficient to warrant the expense, according to H. G. Avery, county agent. The most satisfactory time to poison is when the hoppers are first hatched. At the present time the heaviest damage from hoppers is seen in orchards, gardens, oat fields, and a little later in oat along the edge of newly planted fields. Control is most successful by the use of a poison bran mash prepared as follows:

Mix together 20 pounds of bran or mill run with one pound of Paris green or white arsenic. Then mix together 3 pounds finely chopped, 2 quarts of low grade molasses and 3 gallons of water. Moisten the bran and poison with the liquid mixture to make a moist
