Conscientious Objector Class Is Disciplined. TOKIO (AP).—The Japanese army has a special disciplinary corps for dealing with conscripts who fight their compulsory service too listlessly or who show disrespect toward authority or military discipline, according to Lieutenant General Toshi Ueki, minister of war, speaking to the house of representatives recently. General Ueki did not indicate the methods used, but said the results had been satisfactory.

The spirit of the army is not likely to suffer from such strictness, although it is true that conscripts of such refractory turn of mind are increasing in number, said General Ueki. "The army at first attempted to avoid conscription of such men, but we have found it better to enlist them and then try to make them see the error of their ways. It is also true that the number of men who try to evade military service is increasing, but the army authorities are doing their best to remedy this tendency."

BETTER ROADS HELP TOURIST

CHICAGO (AP).—Oklahoma and South Dakota, two states noted in the past by automobile tourists for their bad roads, are mending their highways with the result that in the future drivers through them will be better equipped.

Oklahoma announces that 250 miles of hard surfaced roads are being built and the rest of the program, together with bridges, will reach \$5,950,000. Twenty-four federal aid projects embracing 127 miles of concrete highway at a cost of \$4,425,000 are being completed by the state highway commission. Twenty-nine stretches of gravel highway including 233 miles are existing and aid of the federal government and totaling \$1,014,000, are being laid.

The commission contemplates spending between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 annually for six years. These counties will vote within the next month on road bills containing more than \$2,000,000.

Financed by 10 percent of a motor vehicle license tax and the entire proceeds from a two-cent tax on gasoline, the concrete-trunk highway system of South Dakota, begun in 1915, will be approximately one-fourth completed and gravel surfaced at the close of 1924, under supervision of the state highway commission.

The system comprises six direct east and west routes through the state and an equal number running north and south. The construction program of this season is the most significant yet undertaken, as it will complete a number of the through routes in the east half of the state.

By the end of the year a total of 4,000 miles of the material system will have been graded. During the last fiscal year the highway fund received \$1,350,000 from automobile, gas and 500,000 from the gasoline tax. This former fund is devoted wholly to new construction and the latter to maintenance.
