German Industrialists Alarmed Over Emigration of Workers

DUSSELDORF, Germany. (AP) — German skilled workers are leaving the fatherland in quest of better luck elsewhere in such alarming numbers that German industry is seriously jeopardized. This is especially true of the Ruhr valley.

A conference was recently held here between representatives of the Prussian government and the Rhineland industrialists, at which this question was aired. The speakers for the industrialists used the following unequivocal language: "The emigration of German workers is reaching greater and greater proportions. The great majority of those emigrants consist of skilled specialty workers. In other words, it is our most capable workers who are leaving their country."

"German industry, which by its nature is dependent upon capable specialty workers as its very backbone, is threatened with annihilation if emigration continues as at present."

No historic avenue in the world presents such a motley array of "structures" as flanks Pennsylvania avenue, that broad thoroughfare between the capital and the treasury.

At the up-town end, near the treasury, there are a number of creditable modern buildings. But below Sixth street, toward the capitol, the only sizeable building not of pre-Civil War vintage houses Henry Ford's flivver and tractor for exhibits.

Here may be found Washington's Chinatown, rendezvous of silk-shirted and pig-tailed Celestials.

Here, also, are the quarters of fortune tellers, palm readers, mediums and psychics. Swooning young women, in brilliantly colored and voluminous skirts and rain-bow hue scarfs toll in the doorways while their brown-skinned, scantily clad children revel in the grime of the gutters.

A few musty, dusty "antique" shops and an odd second-hand book shop or two, alone add "class" to the section of the "Avenue."

One hundred years from now, perhaps in 50, this may be changed. At that time Pennsylvania avenue may be the "beautiful" thoroughfare it is so often pictured. For few of the buildings there can stand longer than that.

But in the meantime—well, it's close to the capitol. There is no pressure for its present development. And land values will keep on rising.

The increment in these values make it more desirable to wait another generation before improving this section than to do it now.

Italian Army Exacts Service Despite Boy's Fine Record. ROME. (AP) — During the war the youngest soldier in the Italian army was Francesco Lavrenco who, driven from his home by the Austrians when the Italians overran the border in 1915, became a volunteer in the Italian regiment of Guides at 12 years of age, and had risen to be sergeant major when he was fifteen. Lavrenco took part in over a dozen big actions and was awarded the silver medal for valor for his bravery on the Piave.

All this, however, has availed the young hero nothing, and as all his achievements occurred before he was 18 years of age, he has been called under arms again to do his ordinary military service. The boy veteran is now stationed at Ferrara, and a public subscription has been opened to give him a gold medal in memory of his unique experiences.

Princeton Star Goes West To Work for Michigan. ANN HARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Harvey C. Emery, Princeton athletic star, joins the University of Michigan staff of coaches in September to assist Fielding H. Yost, director of athletics, in the development of the Wolverine football eleven.

Emery played tackle on the Tiger eleven, was captain of last year's track and wrestling teams and was regarded as the best college hammer and discus thrower in the east. His work at Michigan, in addition to assisting in coaching the varsity football, track and wrestling teams, will be principally in the four year course in physical education, athletics and school health.

KIDDIES PUT UP MEMORIAL

HUTCHINSON, Kansas. (AP) — A memorial of granite with a bronze tablet, set in a little park surrounded by a three-foot stone wall, marks the spot on a farm near here where the late President Harding shocked grain under a brooding sun in June, 1923, when on the transcontinental trip that death. The memorial was dedicated August 2, the anniversary of his death.

It was on the Chester O'Neil wheat farm, eight miles west of Hutchinson, the late President shocked grain in the "Ohio way," as he expressed it to Senator Arthur Capper and Gov. Jonathan M. Davis of Kansas, who once had showed the Kansas way of doing it. Then Mr. Harding drove a harvesting machine several times about the field, so the "newspaper boys could have a story," as Mrs. Harding said.

The President and party had been greeted at the entrance to the farm by a little group of country folk, among them several children. With them the President and Mrs. Harding chatted freely, the President taking some of the children in his arms. These children and others of Reno county, by contributions of nickels and dimes, raised the fund to erect the memorial.

At the top of the entrance to the field was donated by Mr. O'Neil and a pretty little park was laid out, with shrubbery, blue grass and a surrounding stone wall. Here on the top of Hill 1111, where thousands of tourists pass on the highway that is a part of the New Santa Fe trail, the memorial will stand. Atop a flag staff the American flag will fly daily, for the children of the (Ray) school have obligated themselves to be custodians of the colors, to see that the flag is raised and lowered each day.

Wild Country Photographed. SEATTLE, Wash.
