

GOOD PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE BY WOMEN MEDICS

BERLIN. (AP)—German women doctors have made great strides since the empire became a republic and this summer attended European international medical congress in larger numbers than in any other period. The leader of the German delegation which attended the Medical Women's International association meeting in London recently is Dr. Heuser-Edenhuisen, a specialist in women's diseases, and who has reputation in Berlin as high as any of her male colleagues.

Dr. Heuser-Edenhuisen is one of the pioneers of medicine for women in Germany and studied some years ago in the time when matriculation was impossible for female students and they had instead to beg each individual professor for permission to attend his lectures.

Dr. Lydia Rahnowitch-Komniner, of Berlin, a specialist in tuberculosis, Dr. Toni von Langsdorff, of Essen, and Dr. Laura Turban, of Berlin, are other German women physicians who attended the London association meeting.

SPECIFY LOGGING RATE

BEND, Ore.—Logging must be begun within two years on the 21,000,000 feet of timber purchased by the Shewin-Hixon company and the timber must be logged and saved at the rate of at least 20,000,000 feet year. It was learned July 25 from T. A. McCann, vice president of the company and general manager of the Bend plant.

In spite of this requirement in the contract of purchase from the Indian service the Shewin-Hixon company has made no definite plans for logging and saving this timber. Mr. McCann stated.

Dayton Votes School Fund.

DAYTON, Wash.—School district No. 2 in a special election in Dayton authorized a special 3-mill tax levy in addition to the regular 10-mill levy to retire an indebtedness of \$747. The vote was 415 in favor of the measure and 75 against it. Had the levy not been approved Dayton could not have opened its school until January and free-text book and supplies could no longer have been furnished.

Three Premiers Will Speak Before League

GENEVA. (AP)—For the first time in the history of the League of Nations the heads of the three great European powers will attend the assembly which opens September 1. Not only have Premiers MacDonald, Herriot and Mussolini announced their intention of coming, but it is expected all three will make important addresses. The lesser powers are expected to send their foreign ministers.

In view of the increased collaboration of the United States, more particularly with reference to opium and matters affecting the problem of reduction of armaments, the question is being asked at Geneva whether there is any likelihood of Washington sending observers, either official or unofficial.

It is believed in Geneva that disarmament will constitute the great subject of this year's assembly debate. As one Swiss newspaper put it, England's recent declaration of the League of Nations provisional draft treaty of mutual assistance has resulted in the effectual burial of that treaty. It will be examined, undoubtedly, but only to serve as the basis of a general inquiry dedicated to the finding of some more suitable arrangement for the reduction of armaments.

Can security for France and Belgium be made possible through the mechanism of the League? Can definite zones of territory be assigned particular countries in demilitarized? Can special international boundaries, as for instance the borderland between France and Germany, be subjected to international control through the League of Nations, as a means of preventing future war? Can the World Court of Justice at the Hague be utilized more largely as a means of preventing hostilities when danger of war arises in the future? What system can be devised to secure a limitation of armaments which will have the collaboration of the United States?

These are some of the questions which now are turning over in their minds as the assembly approaches. It is not here that the great difficulty to the attainment of a lasting peace lies, but in the practical application of the machinery of the League of Nations in the absence of the United States from the League. This difficulty was clearly pointed out by Premier MacDonald at his recent communication treaty of mutual assistance.

Another subject of preliminary assembly discussion is England's rejection of any plan, such is contained in the pact of mutual assistance, to make the League Council an executive body with very large powers in the control of military forces sent to operate against aggressive states. England wants the council's prerogatives to be kept merely advisory, pointing out that under article 18 of the covenant, the council can only recommend action, while even under article 10 it can only advise.

The trend of thought here is that the League must not seek to thrust its authority upon nations, but through careful examination and carefully weighed opinions and by resultant publicity, indicate to the world where responsibility for aggression lies and suggest conciliatory means of settlement.

The preliminary agenda of the assembly indicates that a great variety of legal, financial, political administrative, technical and humanitarian questions will come before the assembly. The assembly will be told all about the arrangements for the International Opium Conference which will be held at Geneva in November and will hear something of the difficulties which prevent any agreement by the experts for a preliminary draft convention. The problem of Russian and Greek refugees, the position of the mandated world territories, which include some 40,000,000 people, the progress of the reconstruction of Austria and Hungary and the happy solution of the Mosul problem through the assistance of an impartial American, Norman H. Davis, all will come before the delegates.

As for disarmament, the delegates will have before them the text of the treaty of disarmament and security which was drawn up by a group of American citizens and which contains features which have attracted the attention of experts in Europe. This brings the
