gress to determine our future problems when they arise."

Against Corruption.

Recalling the disclosures in connection with the Naval Oil Reserve leases, Mr. Coolidge reiterated his determination to "use every possible effort to resist corruption in office."

"The American government must be clean," he said. "The laws of the land are being, and will continue to be, enforced. The government is sound. Individuals charged with wrongdoing are being prosecuted. The people of this country have corruption. They know the law will be enforced."

Mr. Coolidge served notice on the party to live within its means during the present campaign and to co-operate with the Senate committee in detailing the lists of its expenditures.

"He also plainly told the party that no individual or group of individuals may expect any governmental favors in return for party assistance."

For National Defense.

Taking up only briefly the question of national defense, the president declared he favored "not merely talking about it but doing something about it."

"In a recital of the government's accomplishments since March 4, 1921, Mr. Coolidge mentioned the Arms Conference, the ratification of a treaty of peace, the negotiation of treaties with many countries, repeal of wartime taxes, funding of a large part of the foreign debt, improvement in employment conditions, enhancement of the prices of government bonds, reduction of the cost of government, establishment of the budget, immigration reform, reduction of the army and navy to a "peace time basis," conversion of war materials and supplies into cash, increase in wages, a revival of industry, establishment of the Veterans Bureau, enactment of "generous" laws for the relief of disabled veterans, and establishment of a tariff act.

Touche on Immigration.

Touche on the new immigration law, Mr. Coolidge recalled his preference for a clause on Japanese exclusion which would be "less likely to offend the sensibilities of the Japanese people," but emphasized that the law has been passed, and approved and "the incident is closed."

"We are likely to hear a great deal of discussion about liberal thought and progressive action," he concluded. "It is well for the country to have liberality in thought and progress in action, but its greatest asset is common sense. In the commonplace things of life lies the strength of the nation. It is not in brilliant conceptions and strokes of genius that we shall find the chief reliance of our country, but in the home, in the school, and in religion. America will continue to defend these shrines. Every civil force that seeks to demagogue or deny the nobility of the United States is a disgrace to the people. A higher power has endowed the people with an inherent spirit of resistance. The people know the difference between pretense and reality. They want to be told the truth. They want to be trusted. They want a chance to work out their own material and spiritual salvation. The people want a government of common sense."

"These are some of the beliefs which I hold, some of the principles which I propose to support. Because I am convinced that they are true, because I am satisfied that they are sound, I submit them with abiding faith to the judgment of the American people."

Pasco Legion Post Prospects.

PASCO, Wash.—The American Legion post has one of the best financial reports of any post in the state, according to the statement made by the treasurer at the last meeting. There is \$78 on hand, with \$84 due to the post, and \$1022 in the endowment fund and notes of about \$2000, coming due within three years. The fund was realized by the sale of a farm, left to the legion by Young Abernethy, and will be used eventually to build a home for the legion.

C. S. Churchman and Don J. O'Leary were elected delegates to the legion convention at Walla Walla, with George Hazard and L. H. Lee alternates. The annual legion picnic will be held at Wade's park on August 21.

A REGIME OF "COMMON SENSE" PLAN

government ownership and control and to aggressive war.

The nominee laid particular stress on agriculture, taxes and foreign relations.

Efforts of the administration to relieve agriculture through enactment of 15 laws were recalled by the president, but he insisted "no need in agriculture since organization, co-operation and diversification." He added that the "fundamental remedy was provided, as it always had been provided, not so much through enactment of legislative laws, as through the working out of economic laws." Income of this far-sighted price fixing by legislation must be avoided. "Now that nature and economic

now have given some temporary relief," he continued, "I propose to appoint a committee to investigate and report measures to the congress in December that may help secure this result which we all desire."

For the Farmer.

"The farmer should have the benefit of legislation providing for flood control and development of inland waterways, better navigation east and south from the Great Lakes, reclamation and especially relief for those who cannot meet their payments on irrigation projects. But the main problem is marketing. Co-operative effort, reorganization of the freight rate structure, good business and good wages in manufacturing, and the settlement of European affairs will all help to provide better market conditions."

Incidentally an short-sighted idea of "demagogues" for overtaxing the rich, Mr. Coolidge demanded a further cut in surface rates applying on high incomes.

"I want further tax reduction and more tax reform," he said. "I am not disturbed about the effect on a few thousand people with large incomes, because they have to pay high surtaxes. What concerns me is the indirect effect of high surtaxes on all the rest of the people. Let us always remember the poor. Whatever cry the demagogue may take about his ability to tax the rich, at the end of the year it will always be found that the people as a whole have paid the taxes. Every student knows that excessively high rates defeat their own purpose. They dry up that source of revenue and leave those paying the lower rates to furnish all the taxes."

Pledges Less Expense.

In this connection, Mr. Coolidge promised to cut down the burden of government costs.

"I want the people of America to be able to work less for the government and more for themselves," he said. "I want them to have the rewards of their own industry. That is the chief meaning of freedom."

The president indicated an intention to make several adjustments in the tariff through the classic provisions.

"As the business of the world becomes stabilized," he continued, "without throwing all our economic system into confusion, we can raise or lower specific schedules to meet the requirements of a scientific adjustment."

In foreign affairs, Mr. Coolidge described the administration as seeking only peace—through efforts by the League commission in settling the reparations problem, establishment of many treaties and seeking entrance in the Permanent Court of International Justice. He called attention to the refusal of ratification of the League of Nations Covenant, but recalled cooperation by the government with the league in suppressing the narcotics trade and promoting public health.

"We have every desire to help," he added, "but the time, the place, and the method must be left to our determination. Under our constitution we cannot force the right of the president or the con-
