OSTRICHES WILL RACE HORSES ON BERLIN COURSES

BERLIN (AP).—Ten racing ostriches which are to vie with horses for speed honors in a race course in August have arrived in Berlin and been placed in quarters in stables, which appear to be very distasteful to the big birds.

For racing the ostriches are fitted with light weight saddles and have their work-outs every day when in training, which follows the same general procedure to trotting or pacing horses. The ostriches have names and are carried in the stable boxes just as are thoroughbred horses.

The birds are guided by reins attached to leather caps which

fit over the heads of the ostriches which take the place of bits as used for horses.

"Tony," one of the racers here which came from Italy, and "Frank," owned in Vienna, are "natural born" racers, according to the ostrich racing boys, and appear to love the sport as much as their drivers, but the other fellows, they assert, are sort of mechanical in their racing, merely following directions of their drivers, and without seeming to know what it is all about. But "Frank" and "Tony," say the drivers, know more about racing than any horse which ever got away at the post.

MAY PATTERN AFTER DUTCH

AMSTERDAM (AP).—American town planning experts have been comparing notes with European city builders at an international congress held here recently.

The lure of urban life is as strong in Holland as elsewhere and housing difficulties are acute. With characteristic foresight, however, the Dutch are grappling with the problem in a practical way.

The American delegates voted the recent improvements and extensions of Amsterdam, The Hague and Rotterdam, and even imported them from the air. All agree that the old-fashioned Dutch cities looked far more attractive from aloft than a collection of modern flat-roofed dwellings.

Questions of decentralization, the zoning of civic pride, the disposal of open spaces around cities and the building of "satellite" towns around big centers were discussed by the experts, including the health ministers of Britain and Germany, and leading garden city specialists from all over Europe.

Thomas Adams, of New York, who contended to a distinct preference of the stately 18th century houses of Amsterdam, spoke of the assignment of definite portions of cities to industrial purposes. Walter Searlet and E. D. Goodrich also presented ideas in city planning while Prof. H. J. Hubbard of Harvard university, who favors the star-shaped layout of a city, referred to the necessity of land reservation of open spaces for public recreation grounds.
