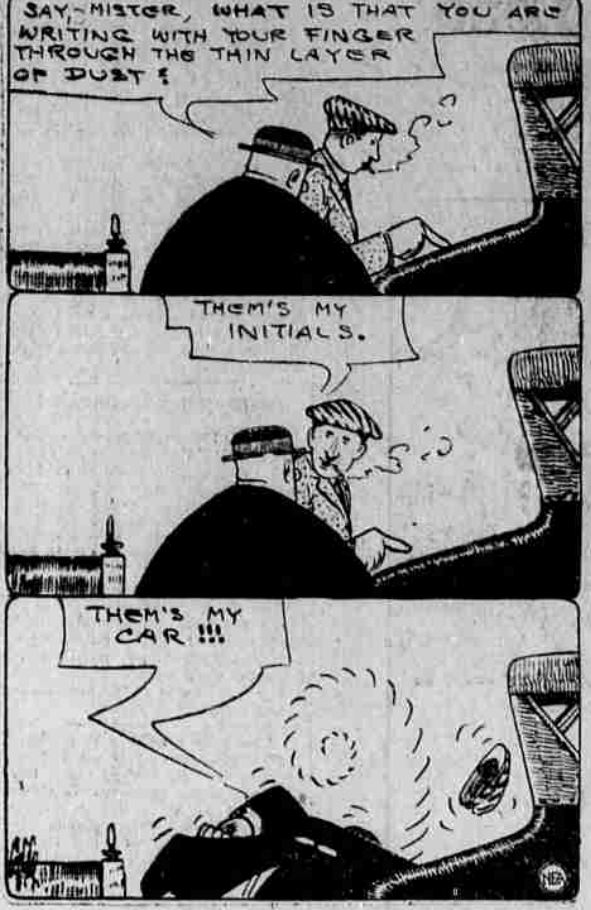

Plenty of Action in New Film.

Movie fans who yearn for action in pictures will get plenty of it when "Monsieur Beaucaire," the Sidney Olcott production for Paramount starring Rudolph Valentino, comes to the Arcade theatre Thursday for a three day run.

The Booth Tarkington story has been unchanged except for the inclusion of a number of scenes in order to build up the French episode in the story.

But it is in the English episode that Valentino has most of his fighting to do. Posing as Beaucaire, a barber, the Duke soon gets into trouble by trying to win Lady Mary away from Lord Winterst. After several unsuccessful attempts to have Beaucaire permanently removed from active competition for Lady Mary's hand, Winterst finally hires six swordsmen to do the work. Valentino's scrap with these six men is a classic.

Rudolph is busily courting Lady Mary, when he is rudely interrupted by the henchmen of Winterst. Quickly removing his coat Rudy gets into the fight and succeeds in picking the men off one by one. As he is finishing the last man, who has stayed out of the fight for a particular purpose, steps in to the fray and the tired Beaucaire is being badly beaten, when the fight is stopped by some friends of Beaucaire, who arrive in the nick of time.

Featured in support of Valentino in this picture which, by the way, marks his first screen appearance in two years, are Belle Daniels, Lois Wilson, Doris Kenyon and Lowell Sherman. Quite a lineup, you'll admit. The supporting cast includes some really big names.

Chaumoogra Grown by U. S. for Leprosy Cure

WASHINGTON (AP)—Under Sam has enlisted in the fight against leprosy from a new angle. At the department of agriculture's station at Bell, Maryland, the government is engaged in propagating chaumoogra plants, from which oil will be obtained to treat leprosy.

About 470 plants are growing in Maryland, and over 2,000 have already been shipped to Hawaii, the Philippines, the Canal Zone and Porto Rico, to mature in the warmth of a tropical sun. There is no place in the United States where the trees will develop fully. This work has been going on since 1920, when Joseph H. Rock, agricultural explorer attached to the office of foreign seed and plant introduction, visited the jungles of Burma and Siam, searching for chaumoogra trees.

Tracing chaumoogra history, Mr. Rock found that its seeds and oil have been known for centuries to the natives of Burma and southeastern Asia in general as palliatives in leprosy and other skin diseases, and were employed by them both externally and internally.

There are about 500 lepers in the United States, as nearly as can be ascertained, says the United States public health service. About 225 are in one colony at Carville, Louisiana. A small colony which was located at Buzzard's Bay in Massachusetts was merged with the Louisiana colony in 1921. There are about 300 registered lepers and it is estimated that around 150 have not been identified.

Those afflicted are looking to chaumoogra oil as their salvation and the results achieved thus far with it lead sanguine medical men to foresee the day when leprosy will be added to the list of maladies which man can control.

Crop Rotation Beneficial

PENDLETON, Ore. — The extremely dry season that has prevailed on the bench land on Weston mountain this summer has given eloquent demonstration of the worth of correct cultural practices in tillage and rotation of crops, according to Fred Beaulieu, county agent. Only during the past few years have farmers diversified greatly on the mountain, and this year potatoes that are on ground plowed up out of red clover and alfalfa are far ahead of those where the rotation has not been so favorable, he said.

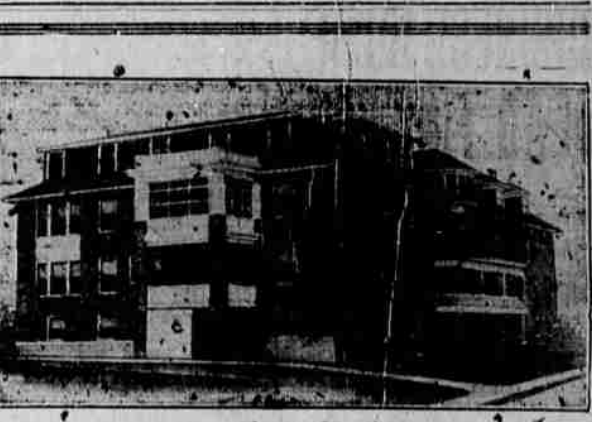
