Hints for the Housewife

SOME GOOD REFRIGERATOR HINTS.

We all know that cantaloupe is most delicious chilled and that the icebox is the most effective form of refrigeration. But cantaloupe plays havoc with butter and milk and, of course, these are essential at every meal and have first claim to the icebox. As a result most housewives do not permit the cantaloupe into the icebox and waste a lot of good ice chilling it outside. But with care this is unnecessary. In order to safeguard milk, which so easily contracts foreign odors and flavors which are bound to generate in the refrigerator, use a covered enameled ware milk kettle. Enameled ware is impervious and so does not transmit or retain odors, and the milk will stay as sweet as when fresh. And for the butter there is now available a sanitary enameled ware dish with an inverted cover. This dish can be used for tub butter, but it was thoroughly designed for the users of print butter.

Keeping cucumbers, pineapple, cheese or similar food in the icebox is also a problem unless covered dishes are used which will not transmit flavors. Enameled ware refrigerator dishes are most serviceable and those who use them will find considerable economy in time because they can be placed on top of each other. In addition to saving space, they can be removed from the refrigerator and placed directly on the fire to warm left-overs, and because they are so well shaped and china-like there need be no hesitancy in placing them on the table as serving dishes. This means a saving in the preparation and washing up.

HOW TO "PRESS" CUCUMBERS

We often hear people say, "I like cucumbers, but they don't like me." The reason in most cases is that the cucumbers have not been properly prepared. They contain a great deal of acid and are likely to be indigestible unless most of the acid is removed. Pressing the acid out of them is the best method.

Peel the cucumbers and cut them into slices about a quarter of an inch thick. Place a layer of cucumbers in an enameled ware bowl or sauce-pan, which is not affected by acids and will not discolor the vegetable. Sprinkle the cucumbers with a little salt, add another layer of cucumbers and salt, and so on. Then place a plate directly on top of the cucumbers and put something heavy on top of the plate—an iron or some canned goods from the pantry will do. Let stand for a few hours. Pour into an enameled ware colander and let the cold water run over them for a minute or two. Set aside to drain thoroughly.

They are very appetizing when served with French dressing as a side dish and are especially nice combined with other vegetables in a salad.
