More than 20 years of active news work in the course of which he has traveled with every candidate for president since the first Bryan campaign in '98, has given Jack a background for political parallels and comparisons unsurpassed by any news writer in the country.

And on occasions when there isn't any news, Nevin, as "personal publicity representative," doubtless will be able to suggest something for the candidate to do or say that will be good for half a column. What else, indeed, is a "publicity representative" for?

SCOOP TELLS OF WALLOWA

Observer Man, Recently Wed, Observes Head Lettuce and Other Things to Eat.

WALLOWA LAKE, Ore., (Special to the Observer) — "The Bear" is dead.
After three years of residence at the Wallowa Wonderland—during which he was viewed by thousands of people—due to his own misdeeds, faced a firing squad at six Wednesday. Only one bullet was necessary.
It all came about because brain was becoming more apt to "play rough" as time went on. Last year he was cranky at times but this year it came to a climax. Altho cranky at times, he was easy to get along with most of the time—often wrestling with those who had the nerve to let him try his

"half-dick" on them.
Wednesday morning he got hold of a small girl and playfully "hugged" her. But his embraces, though not intentionally rough, were too much for the little girl, especially when he bumped her head against a small fence.
So a gun was procured and the bear led away and shot—before a small audience.
Bears was captured three years ago in the hills near here, when he had a cub. He was a brown bear and weighed around 250 pounds and had spent all of his life at the park.

When the weather is good many expeditions go to Anecold, Ice lakes and others.
Wallowa Lake now has all the advantages of home with Mother Nature, in the pine trees, rugged mountains, and lake gems, present also.
In addition to electricity, running hot and cold water and so forth, the Morning Oregonian, the Oregon Journal, the Evening Observer, the Enterprise Record-Chief and other papers are delivered as expeditiously as possible and when one doesn't need to "let the rest of the world go by" without knowing about it. The Oregonian reaches here (the same day printed) at 5:30 p. m.
